WEEKEND PLANNED FOR O.S.R. PROGRAM TO HIGHLIGHT FELLOWSHIP

Plans have been made to insure that the Spring Weekend at Onteora Scout Reservation on May 28-30 will not be soon forgotten by the Buckskins who attend.

Most of the Brothers--including the Lodge Chief and Officers--will take advantage of the low-cost bus transportation leaving from Harkness on Friday at 6 p.m. Upon arrival there will be plenty of time for meeting old friends and new as the Brothers register, are assigned to sleeping quarters, and enjoy the traditional feed.

After breakfast on Saturday there will follow the usual program of Cheerful Service. On this weekend most of the projects will involve preparing Onteora for the rapidly-approaching summer camp seson-clearing the campsites, setting up tents, painting, and generally putting the camp into working order. With the honest help of every Brother this work should pass quickly.

Instead of continuing all day, the Brothers will stop all work in mid-afternoon. The rest of the afternoon will be free time. The lake will be open for swimming if the weather is warm enough, so bring your swim trunks just in case."

NEW DISTRICT ALIGNMENT

Beginning July 1, 1965, Nassau County Council will operate from six districts instead of the fifteen now in use. This new arrangement is expected to provice more efficient administration at a lower cost.

The new six-district arrangement was formed along existing school district boundaries. Below are listed the six districts and the communities which will comprise them.

DISTRICT 1: Albertson, East Williston, Garden City Park, Garden City South, Great Neck, Herricks, Manhasset, New Hyde Park, Port Washington, Boslyn, Williston Park.

DISTRICT 2: Bellerose, East Mesdow, Elmont, Floral Park, Franklin Square, Warden City, Hempstead, Mine ols, Steward Manor, West Henpstead, Uniondale.

DISTRICT 3: Bethpage, Farming-dale, Hicksville, Island Trees, Levittown, Old Bethpage, Plainedge, Plainview.

DISTRICT 4: Bellmore, Freeport, Masssipequa, Massapequa Fark, Merrick, Sesiford, Wantagh. (cont. p. 4)

A delegation of 45 Brothers from Buckskin Lodge will attend the Order of the Arrow Golden Anniversary National Conference. They will depart from Massau in a confortable chartered bus on Wednesday, August 25, and will return home on September 2. Air Force bases will be used for sleeping facilities along the coute.

The Conference will be held at Indiana University from August 27 to 31. The Wational Conference Committee promises this to be not only the largest conference, but also the best in terms of program and inspiration. The activities will revolve around the theme "Mindful of Our High Tradition." A Buckskin Lodge display is being planned for the Conference.

The conference fee, which covers room and board at the University, is \$32. The round trip bus fee is \$25. The Lodge has reserved space for 45 delegates at the Conference and on the bus. 

from the EDITOR'S DESK

With the words, "mindful of our high tradition...", Meteu greets the new Brothers of the Lodge in the Ordeal Ceremony, as they dedicate themselves to a life-long program of Brotherhood, Cheerfulness, and Service. These ideals have long held revered positions in the minds of Buckskins, and with few exceptions continue to be practiced. But an all-consuming apathy, nourished by our mammoth membership, has been threatening to obliterate our "high traditions."

Since 1923, when the Buckskin Sons of Wauwepex first became part of our camping program, the white squaw feather has been the symbol of service to thousands of Scouts and Scouters. At the last weekend several announcements were made before the ceremonies to make sure that each Brother wore his feather, but a count at the rings revealed that only about half the Brothers actually were mindful of their high traditions.

And now, as another weekend rolls around, the announcement has again been made for Buckskins to wear their feathers. Will the traditions of the Lodge be upheld, or will a gross disregard for Lodge policies and customs signal a general decline in the quality of the Lodge's operations?

The memory of his unselfish service will outlive us all.






In the past month letters were mailed out to those Brothers eligible for the Brotherhood membership. On the last weekend, four Brothers were tapped out for Brotherhood membership.

LODGE RESPONDS TO ANNIVERSARY

Due to the tremendous response on the part of the Lodge members to the 50th Anniversary Award, the TAB has been asked to reprint the requirements from the December issue.

The award, a special emblem to be worn on the Order of the Arrow sash, will be provided for each Lodge Member who fulfills the requirements listed below during 1965 and has his work certified by his muit leader and approved by Mr. Ken Heim, Lodge Advisor. This award is limited to members under 21 years of age.

To qualify for this emblem, Lodge Members must meet the following requirements.

1- Maintain active interest in your own unit and in the Order of the Arrow; be properly registered with your unit and have your Order of the Arrow dues paid.

2- Attend at least one long-term camp or superactivity with your unit (six days and nights for

Boy Scouts; five days and nights for Explorers.)

3- Participate in at least one council-approved Order of the Arrow service project and give six or more hours of cheerful service.

4- Advance one rank in Scouting, i.e., First Class to Star, Star to Life, Life to Eagle.

Explorers participate in the unit's specialty or activity program. Explorers may, if they wish, earn five or more Merit Badges.


5- Recruit, train, and follow through to see that one new boy becomes a Cub Scout, Boy Scout, or an Explorer. (This requirement must be certified by the new boy's unit leader.)

Individual scorecards were given out at the Wauwepex Weekend and will be distributed at the Onteora Weekend, as long as the supply holds out. The deadline for reporting and applying for the award is Movember 1, 1965.
