LAST CALL FOR CONFERENCE

From August 27 to 31, the Fiftieth Anniversary National Order of the Arrow Conference will be held at the University of Indiana. The Lodge has made bus and conference reservations, planned a route and program, and assembled a display. The only problem is lack of delegates. In order to complete our delegation and fill the bus, 15 more boys or adults are needed.

Neighboring lodges have already filled their delegation quota, despite the fact that their bus fee is over \$70. The round trip fee for our Lodge's bus (not a school bus) is only \$23. Delegates will be traveling in the company of their Lodge brothers. The costs along the route for food and sleeping facilities at armed service bases is minimal.

At the conference a program of fellowship, fun, and training is planned. Knowledge gained will be helpful for future Lodge leaders. Speak to anyone of last conferences delegates about fun and enjoyment. The complete fee for room and food at the University at Bloomington, Ind., is \$32. A distinctive neckerchief and patch is awarded to each delegate.

The members and advisors of the Nominating Committee met at Harkness on Thursday, May 20, to count the ballots. The deadline for ballot returns was May 19.

An innovation was made in the election procedure this year with the introduction of the mail-in ballot. These ballots were sent to all actively-registered members of the Lodge with the April TAB. Only those members under 21 years of age however, were authorized to cast ballots.

Last year the Lodge held a special meeting at Harkness for the specific purpose of electing officers. In the years before that it had been the practice of the Lodge to conduct the elections at the Spring Wauwepex Weekend. Both these methods proved unsuccessful in that few of the eligible Brothers had the opportunity to cast their votes.

This election is considered by the Nominating Committee and Lodge Chief, Vic Lambert, to have been very successful, due to the large number of ballots returned. There were 339 ballots cast, out of approximately 900 eligible voting members of the Lodge. This was the greatest number of ballots ever cast in any previous Lodge election.


VIRGIN ISLANDS



Then the new Ordeal Members will be instructed in how to run ceremonies and other OA functions. Our Lodge will also supply them with some of the equiptment they will need to run their organization.

The Brothers, who will be picked by our Lodge Chief at some later date, will use their own equipment. During their stay, they'll sleep in tents on the beach with their food provided by the Virgin Islanders. Arrangements are now being made for transportation.

We wish the Scouts in the Virgin Islands much luck with their new Lodge.

50th ANNIVERSARY AWARD

Scorecards for the 50th Anniversary Award have been mailed to each Lodge. Every Arrowman should have one of these cards and follow up to meet the requirements by November 1, 1965. The following are among the most frequently asked questions about the award.

Q.: What is the rank requirement for Explorers?

A.: There is no rank requirement for Explorers. However, they are required to take an active part in the activities and the program of their respective units. This must be certified by their unit leaders.

Q.: What is the camping or super-activity requirement for Explorers?

A.: An outdoor experience of 5 or more days and nights with their unit.

Q.: Is there a rank requirement for Boy Scouts in a troop who are over 14 years of age?

A.: Yes: First Class to Star, Star to Life, Life to Eagle. There to Life, Life to Eagle. There are no further rank requirements for Eagle Scouts.

Q .: Can assistant Scoutmasters and associate Explorer Advisors under 21 years of age earn the award?

A.: Yes, but Scouters over 21 years of age are ineligible.

Q.: If a Scout or Explorer serves on the Camp Staff, can he qualify for the long-term camping requirement?

A.: Yes, if his unit attends camp while he is in camp.

Q .: Why is it that Boy Scout Arrow members must advance in rank while there is no advancement requirement for Explorers?

A.: Exploring does not have an ad-vancement program. It would be unrealistic to require Explorer Arrowmen to advance in rank. Boy Scouting on the other hand has The last work weekend of the 1964-65 Lodge year was held at Onteora Scout Reservation May 28-30.





The officers are running for the betterment of the Lodge, and not for any personal achievement."
