O.S.R. Summer Wrap-up

Onteora, characterized by its rapid growth during the last decade, was on the move again this summer. The addition of the Blauministration Building were but two improvements made at camp. These changes in the camp layout and the improvements necessitated by growth provided the basis of the CA service projects.

During the course of the summer 219 candidates were inducted. In keeping with the basic philosophy of the Order of the Arrow, the Ordeal tapouts were held in individual Troop sites. Each of the six program areas had a tapout team which consisted of Allowat Sakima, Meteu, and a coordinator. This mehas the additional advantage in that more Brothers gain experience in conducting Indian ceremonies than would otherwise be possible. After the tapout, all the sheepskins were assembled under the direction of the ceremonial team. Ken Westerberg was Allowat Sakima. Mike Kelly was Meteu, Bill Dunn was Nutiket, and Jay Bush was Kichkinet.

The summer camp season also saw the induction of 43 new Brotherhood members. They were tapped during the main Council Fire on Visitors' Day, and the ceremony was held on the second Thursday night. Kenneth South was Allowat, Ron Lyke was Meteu, Peter Biasi was Nutiket, and Paul Plate was Kichkinet.

The highlight of the summer's activities was the Vigil Honor Callout which the Brothers were privileged to witness in the third period. In recognition for his many years of faithful service to the Order, Lodge Chief Ken Westerberg was called to the Vigil.

All in all the OA had a highly successful season at Onteora. The Brothers are looking forward to the next camping season, during which we hope to maintain the same high level of service.

Buckskin Peace Corps

During July Buckskin Lodge had the rare and wonderful privilege to serve outside the continental United States. We sent a team of five to the Virgin Islands to help their Scout Council organize a new lodge of their own. The team consisted of Stanley H. Drupieski, advisor; Tom Bligh, a past chief; Greg Gilmartin, past Treasurer; Vic Lambert, past Chief; and Butch Meola, Little Lodge Chief.

The first and most important purpose of the trip was to run the Ordeal and the ceremonies, which were made more impressive by the use of three beautiful, new podiums donated and made by Stanley Drupieski, Bob Hughes, and Sid Schwartz.

On July 15th, the team left Kennedy Airport at 8:45 A.M.. had arrived at St. Groix in a light rain. The team was then taken to Camp Big. Pond of the Virgin Islands Council.

It is a new camp of about 35 acres situated on the Carribbean Sea. There is a coral reef about a quarter of a mile off shore that reduces the swells and leaves the water smooth and crystal clear—so clear, in fact, that you could see the sea bottom. The water is only slightly cooler than the surrounding air and is extremely salty.

On Friday the team inspected the camp and picked a site for a potential Ceremonial Ring. The same afternoon they cleared out the ring. It turned out to be quite a hard job, but it was well worth the effort.

Friday night the team helped put on a campfire. Members of the team demonstrated Indian dancing and led several songs. The team dressed quickly and tapped out 28 candidates. After the smoothly-run Pre-(cont. on page 4)





Ordeal ceremony the sheepskins slept soundly for the rest of the night.

Saturday morning the team awoke prepare for the day's Ordeal. to prepare for the day's Ordeal.
Members of the team served as everything—Taskmasters, ring committee, ceremonial team, and whatever else had to be done for the Ordeal and ceremony. The main task during the Ordeal was to prepare a council fire area by removing undergrowth and landscaping the area. The ground was covered with heavy bush known as "cashir," whose inch-long thorns proved slightly toxic. The area was cleared with machetes, axes, rakes, and brawn, and the stifling weather made it easy to become dehydrated. By midmorning everyone felt as if the Ordeal had already lasted two days. It was especially rough on the team, for they were not used to such hot weather. However, the team and sheepskins kept working all day with breaks for water every hour and a half. They finally finished clearing the area and started leveling for the seats.

That night about 8 o'clock it grew dark and the candidates were led down the trail to the new ceremonial ring prepared by the team the day before. To get to the ring the candidates walked up a narrow gorge guided by the flickering light of smudge pots in the cranies of the walls. At the end of the trail the gorge opened up into an area much like a cavern with the team looking down at the candidates in the darkness. The ceremony proceeded very smoothly as 27 candidates were inducted.

After the ceremony a banquet was held. It was just about the first chance the team had to eat. The Brothers were served baked ham, fried chicken, potatoes with raising, rice, and other local dishes.



Sunday morning after church the team ran an orientation meeting and helped the new Lodge select their officers. The team continued to instruct the officers and new committee chairman for the rest of the morning. The afternoon was spent with the many visitors who came to the camp.

Sunday evening Butch and Vic started their first dance team and taught them several Indian dances. That night everybody on the Buckskin team had his turn leading songs, and the Virgin Island's dance team put on their first dance. The Buckskin team even led a skit.

-Monday morning at 6 A.M. the team left Camp Big Pond and proceeded to St. Thoman. At St. Thomas Mr. Sam King, the Scout Executive, took the team around the island. That night they bedded down in the council office.

On Tuesday at 9:30 A.M. the members of the team regretfully said good-bye to the Virgin Islands and its wonderful people.
