Ordeal candidates will be tapped out on the Second Sunday evening of each period and the Pre-Ordeal will follow immediately. Tapouts will be held at individual program area campfires at Onteora and at the Visitors' Day campfire at Wauwepex. The Ordeal will be run on the second onday of each period at each camp and will be followed by the Ordeal ceremony on Monday evening.

Brotherhood tapouts are scheduled for the Visitors' Day campfires at both camps. Brotherhood ceremonies will be held during the second week of each period. Candidates for the Vigil Honor will be called out at a special ceremony at a Visitors' Day campfire during one period at each camp.

Brothers are reminded that only Ordeal candidates attending camp for two weeks will be permitted to take their Ordeal. All Brothers attending camp are urged to attend the Lodge meeting and act as a guide and taskmaster for the Ordeal during his period.
