### That It's Time Again

With spirits aloft and our goals set high, the members of Buckskin Lodge leave school and embark upon another promising summer of fun and service. After this past spring's record elections, one of the lar-

gest groups of inductees will enter our Lodge in ceremonies to be held at Camp Wauwepex and Onteora Scout Reservation. Undoubtedly, the warm season is here, and it's that time again - time for summer camping.

As usual, the Ordeal tapouts will be held four times during the season, the second Sunday of each period, at each camp. At Wauwepex, the ceremony will take place at the 'Visitor's Day campfire, while Onteora will again have tapouts at the individual program area campfires. The Pre-Ordeal will begin that same evening and run through the next day, Monday. After successful com-pletion of the ordeal, the candidates will participate in the impressive Ordeal ceremony Monday night, to be followed by the muchawaited "feed".

The Brotherhood tapout will be held each period at both camps during the Visitor's Day campfire, the ceremony itself being scheduled for the latter part of the second week. The Vigil Honor candidates, however. will be called out only during one period at each camp, to be designated at a later date.

During the Onteora weekend, the 1967-1968 administration came to an end in the true spirit of the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service. The successful endeavors of cur immediate Past Lodge Chief Paul Plate were reflected in the tremendously successful four-day weekend. I congratulate Paul on a fine job well done!

Many of the general Lodge policies initiated during the past years will be continued in this administration. The Buckskin Uniform Drive, which is now being suggested by the National Order of the Arrow commit-tee as a Lodge "Good Turn," will be carried on and hopefully every underprivileged Scout in the Council will receive a uniform. Cheerful Service will be given and further donations will be contributed to the construction of the Buckskin Camp at Onteora Scout Reservation. The new weekend job sign-up procedure will be continued to create greater service. Brotherhood candidates will be required to serve as taskmasters during Ordeals.

A more concentrated effort will be made to get more Brothers to serve on committees. It will be mandatory that every chairman form a working committee instead of doing the job himself. The chairman will be required to contact all interested Brothers and get them to help out when there is work to complete.

The Order of the Arrow was founded as a Society of Honor Scout Campers and Arrowmen are expected to promote Scout camping. Buckskin Brothers will be expected to promote such camping in their own units through personal participation. The Camp Promotions Committee will start work immediately to get more units to go on short-term camping trips. Starting early in the winter, a tremendous effort will be made to contact as many of the council units as possible and convince them to go to summer camp.

To further our relationship with the individual units of each district and to coordinate the efforts of the various committees, adult district advisors are being appointed. They will attend district roundtables and relate to the unit leaders of the services and activities of the Order.

Under the revised unit Election Procedure, more Scouts were elected to Arrow membership this year than ever before in Buckskin Lodge history. The job of inductions will not be as difficult as it could be if all Brothers attending summer camp lend a hand during the Ordeals. Tlease attend the O.A. meeting during your Summer Camp period and offer a day of Cheerful Service. Buckskin Lodge will be headed by Dennis Klein as Summer Camp Chief at Camp

I challenge each of you to fight for the ideals of your organization. Only through our constant efforts will our eyes rest upon the light green meadow of peace and understanding where men live a Brotherhood of Cheerful Service. "Until you have become really, in actual fact, a brother to everyone, brotherhood will not come to pass."

Thank you for the honor of having led Buckskin Lodge towards such a Brotherhood. "Nothing we have done will ever be good enough again."

Wauwepex and I will serve as Chief at Onteora.

The challenges of the coming year are not easy and all Brothers will be needed to make this administration a true success. The great potential of Brotherhood, Leadership, and Cheerful Service present in Buckskin Lodge can and will be developed. I command each Brother to wear his squaw feather of Cheerful Service and Leadership in the true spirit of Brotherhood!

### O.S.R. INSTALLATION MAKES IT OFFICIAL

At a brief but inspiring ceremon which was the highlight of Saturday evening's campfire, the old administration made way for the new.


