In Memoriam F. Howard Covey

1883 - 1969

Everyone involved in the Scouting movement in Nassau County will never forget the ideals and principles of F. Howard Covey, the founder of Nassau County Council, B.S.A., who died this past May 8.

In 1916, Howard Covey led a group which called on former Fresident Theodore Roosevelt to help organize the Scout movement in Nassau. The following year, the council's charter was granted; Mr. Roosevelt was the first commissioner and Mr. Covey was the executive. Fr. Covey held this post until retiring to a volunteer capacity in 1948. "Chief" Covey then continued his Scouting activities until his death, and belonged to the Sagamore Lodge, an organization for eminent former members.

After he had been initiated into the Order of the Arrow at one of the National Conferences, he used many of the ideas of the Order such as the Tap Out and the Ordeal in the Buckskin Sons of Wauwepex program.

During World War I, Mr. Covey was an Army captain and worked with the War Camp Community Service.

Mr. Covey was also a former president of the American Red Cross, Nassau Chapter, advisory board member on Long Island of the Salvation Army, trustee of the Nassau County
