"... Circle our council fire, weld tightly every link, that binds us in Brotherhood..." This, part of the Song of our Order, brings to mind a famous axiom: "a chain is only as strong as its weakest link." This, I think, aptly applies to our Lodge. As implied in the Song, every Brother in Buckskin Lodge is a part of the chain of all members. Each is dependent upon the others one link, no matter how strong, cannot hold together the whole chain if the others are weak. Towards the end of the Banquet, it was announced that a profit had been made because of the large attendance, and that it would be donated to the Buckskin Camp at Onteora. The Banquet came to an end solemnly when the Rev. Michael Carman offered a benediction and the Song of the Order was sung by all.

At the Banquet, "Father Dave" Reddy disclosed that he will no longer be serving at the summer camps or in the Council because he plans to undertake missionary work in the South Pacific. Many Scouts and Brothers remember Father Dave as being the Catholic Chaplain at Camp Wauwepex for so many years. # VIGIL NOMINEES STILL SOUGHT

The Vigil Committee, whose function it is to choose those Brothers who are to be bestowed with the Vigil Honor, is now in the first stages of its monumental task. Before any choosing can take place, the committee must first acquire a list of the members of the Lodge who are most deserving to receive the highest honor of the Lodge. This is not an easy job, and thus the Vigil Committee asks each and every member of the Lodge to help.

How can you help? By examining the qualifications of your fellow Lodge members and deciding whether or not you know of anyone who truly is worthy of the Vigil Honor. Anyone can nominate a Brother - you need not be a Vigil member to do so. Also, a member may nominate as many Brothers as he wishes, provided, or course, that he is eligible.

Eligibility for Vigil Honor is based upon many qualifications. One must have completed at least two years of service as a Brotherhood member as of February 1, 1969. He must also be currently registered in Scouting and the Lodge, but may be either a boy or adult member.

Most important is the Brother's character, which is determined on the basis of his service to the Lodge, Scouting, his community, and his church. Before deciding to nominate someone, ask yourself "Has he always done his utmost to live up to the principles of the Order and Scouting?" If the answer is yes, then it is your duty to submit his name to this committee.

On Sunday, two more drawings will be held, and the prizes will be a sleeping bag and another period at camp. The same rules apply.


