FELLOWSHIP WEEKEND NEARS

The 1969 Camping Season for Buckskin Lodge will get underway on Friday night, April 11, when over four hundred Arrowmen are expected to gather at Camp Wauwe-pex for a weekend of fellowship and cheerful service.

Registration for this event must hegistration for this event must be done in advance. Enclosed with this issue of the <u>Tab</u> is a Weekend Registration Card. This must be sent in before the deadline, which is April 3, along WITH your fees. Because of the rising cost of food, meal tickets will cost \$3.00 for members, and \$5.00 for candidates.

Last fall, the Wauwepex Weekend was overcrowded with unregistered members despite the fact that they were informed that there would be no room. This caused much confu-sion and wasted manpower. To correct this, all fees must be paid in advance and are NOT REFUNDABLE after the deadline. They are, how-ever, transferable to another member if you cannot attend. A limit of four hundred (400) members has been set. Registration in excess

Buckskins Plan 5th Annual Hootenanny



My Brothers,

As a member of the 1969 Nominating Committee, I can truthfully say that the nominees for Lodge Office for 1969-70 are all outstanding Arrowmen and each one would do an excellent job if elected. It is your responsibility as a voting member of the Lodge to select the most qualified candidates to fill the demanding positions of Lodge office.

Lodge officers must be active, enthusiastic, and willing - to - dohard - work Arrowmen. Tenure in the Lodge and Scouting and Scout rank are only important to a small degree when compared to committee service and 0.A. weekend service that the candidate has rendered since his induction. The Buckskin Arrowman who has given cheerfully of his time on committees and weekends, even if he has only been in the Lodge for a short time would surely be more qualified than a Brother who has been in a long time and has infrequently served the Lodge.

Look back to the major criteria used in unit Ordeal elections. The Scout to be elected is the one that deserved the honor because of his Cheerful Service. The Scout that should not be elected is the one whose only asset is popularity. It is good to have a popular Arrowman elected if he is qualified and willing to do the job. If an Arrowman's only qualification is popularity, he doesn't deserve your vote.

I trust that you, my Brothers, will carefully choose an outstanding team of officers for the upcoming administration that will work to gether toward the "realization of the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service."

You arrive at an Order of the Arrow Weekend on time and it takes three hours to register (and you still don't get a seat at the meals.) The taskmasters aren't aware of their responsibilities in their specific jobs and therefore work is done incorrectly. Numerous announcements, which receive no response, are made Friday evening for guides and Brotherhood sponsors. On the Wauwepex Weekend next month, all of these weekend problems will be greatly curtailed if two requirements are fulfilled before the weekend.

I feel confident in having the first requirement fulfilled-to have the committee chairman responsible for running the weekend plan and coordinate before the weekend. A

future of Buckskin Lodge could very well be in your hands, so choose wisely whom you feel will best serve the Lodge and make it run successfully.

Only those Brothers who are presently under 21 years of age and are active Buckskin Lodge members can vote. Adult members who are not eligible will not receive the ballot card, but of course, it is possible that an eligible Brother will not get a ballot card. If this occurs, contact Tom Dede (see article on page).

The Lodge Chief's job is a big responsibility. He must oversee Lodge activities and assure the smooth-running of the Lodge through his Little Lodge Chiefs. The Lodge Chief presides at all Lodge functions and is an ex-officio member of all committees. He also appoints all committee chairmen and their advisors.

The two Little Lodge Chiefs act as "right-hand men" for the Lodge Chief, working with him in running the Lodge. Their responsibility includes seeing that the committees work together smoothly and efficiently and they work directly with the chairmen. In case the Lodge Chief is absent, one of the Little Lodge Chiefs assumes his duties.

The Corresponding Secretary must retain a complete and up-to-date mailing list of all active Lodge members. All Lodge mailings, including the <u>Tab</u> and information flyers, fall under his jurisdiction.

The Recording Secretary maintains the accurate Lodge records of each Brother. He must also take the minutes of all Lodge functions.

The Treasurer is responsible for collecting Lodge dues from each Brother and for keeping an account of the Lodge finances.

All of these jobs require much work and dedication. The Brothers nominated are obviously all qualified, but it is you who must choose the best among them. The biographical sketches and pictures of all the candidates can be found on pages three, four, and five. Review each one's service record and previous experience carefully before picking the Brothers that you feel are best qualified to hold office.

The deadline for ballots is April 16, 1969. Any ballots received after this date will be declared invalid. Ballot cards should be sent to:

History in the Making

Brothers, you are now reading a bit of Buckskin Lodge's history in the making. The <u>Buckskin Tab</u>, the official publication of our Lodge, was first printed on November 14, 1952, under the editorship of Bill Harper. It began as a single sheet of dittod typing, much like a troop newspaper is - all headings were hand lettered by the staff. Although the number of pages increased through the years, it remained a two-column, typed, and hand-lettered issue that came out every few months.

In October, 1962, the <u>Buckskin</u> <u>Tab</u> heading was first employed, and three months later the first threecolumn, reduced typing issue was published (January, 1963) when Fred Miska was editor.

The first color issue was printed in December, 1964 (a red Christmas edition) and the super - imposed arrow in the background of the heading was added by Mike Kelly in March, 1966.

Over the years, many improvements have been made, with new headings, columns, and type styles being continuously added. Most issues have been four pages, with six page issues interspersed. Three times eight - page issues appeared in 1957 and 1958, when it was still a two column publication. Since then, only once has a modern issue ran that long (March, 1965). This month, for the first time in history, the <u>Buckskin Tab</u> is a big, ten-pages long.

How was this accomplished? To begin with, there were an exceptionally large number of events occurring at this time, including the Lodge officer elections. Another effective way is known as using "fillers," which entail interesting but irrelevant sidelights, to take up space. The article you are now reading is one of these.

So save this issue, Brothers it is a little bit of Buckskin's History!

from our Little Lodge Chiefs

For the first fifteen years after its birth, the Lodge elected its officers at a Lodge meeting. The nominees were set, which was usually followed by minor debate, and those members present selected the leaders of the Lodge for the next year. Everyone saw the candidates and most were familiar with their records. It was rare that at-

tendance at the meeting prohibited it from being held at the Harkness Training Center.

As the Lodge grew in size, it became impossible to hold elections in this manner. There were too many members to hold such a meeting anywhere. Any occasion like a weekend would draw too small a percentage of the membership. Besides, no date convenient to most members would have been able to be determined. In answer to these problems, the present system was created.

The ballot for voting is mailed to every eligible Lodge member, thereby giving each one the opportunity to participate in the year's administration. One would think that this system would greatly increase participation in elections. Yet despite the convenience in voting, a response of fifty percent of the members is a very good turnout.

Brothers will never cease to gripe about conditions on weekends, about mailings or Lodge policy. Yet, when they get a chance to exert a constructive influence on the Lodge, they haven't the time. A Brother can always express his opinions by speaking to an officer or chairman. He can address the Executive Committee or the entire Lodge (through the <u>Tab</u>). He can also vote for the candidate of his choice!




Roy has served on the Ceremonial Committee and has attended most of the weekends since his induction. Roy will be returning to the camp staff.

DO YOU KNOW HOW TO VOTE?

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Enclosed within this issue of the Tab is an official Buckskin Lodge 1969 Ballot Card. Only this can be used to register your vote anything else will be declared invalid. The ballot card is being sent only to eligible members (those under twenty-one years of age). For details on this, see the article on page 1.

First and foremost, be sure to check the box at the top of the card to pledge that you are a voting member of the Lodge. Failure to do this will automatically invalidate your vote.

In order to vote for a nominee, simply place a check in the box next to the name of the candidate of your choice. Vote for ONE Lodge Chief, TWO Little Lodge Chiefs, ONE Corresponding Secretary, ONE Treasurer, and ONE Recording Secretary. There are three candidates for Treasurer, but be sure to vote for only one.

OFFICER

It is not necessary to vote for a candidate for every office. If you feel that no one is qualified, then make no marks in any box for this office. If, however, you vote more than the maximum number of times (one for each position, two for Little Lodge Chief, making a total of six votes), your entire ballot will be discounted. Be careful not to make any stray marks. Vote now - and choose carefully!

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


