

TOPS ALL BANOUET

It was a little more than 24 hours before the 1970's and looking back on the last decade, Buckskin Lodge had much to be thankful for. During that time it became one of the most successful Lodges in the country. Moreover, camping in Nassau County Council reached an all-time high. Surely the Twentieth Annual Buckskin Banquet, held at the Garden City Hotel on December 30, 1969, will always be remembered as a stepping stone between the sixties and the seventies. Despite inclement weather, more than 1400 Arrowmen gathered there, dedicating

themselves to the forthcoming challenges of fellowship, service, and cheerfulness.

Probably the most impressive aspect of the Banquet (aside from the waitresses) was that approximately 50% of the Lodge membership participated. No doubt, a fine chance to meet new Brothers was extended; and there was a special opportunity for fellowship between old friends. As in past years, the gaily decorated banquet hall was an astounding sight, and the mealitself was delicious. Ken Westerberg, Master of Ceremonies for the Evening, began the festivities by seating and welcoming the overwhelming crowd. Then the Rev. A. Eric van Leeuwen administered the mealtime grace.

After the feast, luau, bon-repas, or what you will, Lodge Chief Carlos Kebe expressed his greetings and introduced the Committee Chairmen. He also thanked those who spent months of

planning for the Banquet to be such a success.

A number of special presentations and recognitions were made during the course of the evening. Larry Starr, presently Little Lodge Chief (other LLC Joe Bruno was in the hospital and unable to attend) presented Don Heiberg with the Past Lodge Chief's award. Larry acclaimed Don's term of office as opening up new doors to service for the Lodge. He expressly cited the "double" work weekends, the new District Representatives which serve communities, and the 50th Anniversary incentive award.

Don Heiberg then gave a check for \$2500 to Nassau Co. Council President Morris Rochman, to be contributed to the fund-raising campaign of the BSA. Mr. Rochman, accepting the award, nevertheless told Don that "a Scout is trustworthy," and he would just have to admit that he was handed a "bum" check. Mr. Rockman later gave an inspiring and amusing speech in which he promised that all of Nassau's camping programs would continue in full swing.

The 1400 Brothers were also greeted by Scout Executive James M. Davenport, Jr. (pictured below), who declared that he was "glad to be back" to work with such a fine group of young men. Council Commissioner Henry Rockhill

added a few words, too.



A highlight of the evening was the appearance of the Guest Speaker, Helen M. Olsen manager of the Sea Cliff Branch of the Franklin National Bank. She was introduced by Ken Westerberg, who spoke of her service in public affairs and her credits in "Who's Who of 1969". Mrs. Olsen, though given very short notice, gave a fine speech about Banking as a career. She emphasized the values necessary in a finance worker, especially those that relate to Scouting-honesty, courtesy, preparedness, and confidence. The first woman ever to speak at a Buckskin Banquet, Mrs. Olsen told Mr. Rochman that had the \$2500 check been from her bank, he would have had no worries.

Other features of the Banquet were a filmstrip in which Buckskin appeared as "The National Standard Lodge", two rousing songs led by Ken South, and the Vigil Honor presentations. The evening of fellowship was closed with Carlos Webe leading the Song of the Order.
Whereas two years ago, our Banquet had "Co-

ming of Age" as its theme, this year's expressed the beginning of a new era in the realization of W.W.W.

VIGIL (Cont.)

"The Vigil Honor is a high mark of distinction and recognition reserved for those Scout, Explorer, and Scouter members of the Order who, by reason of exceptional service, personal effort, and unselfish interest, have made distinguished contributions beyond the immediate responsibilities of their position or office to one or more of the following: their Lodge, the Order of the Arrow, Scouting, or the Scout camp. Under no circumstances should tenure in Scouting or the Order be considered as ample reason for Vigil Honor recommendation."

To be eligible for Vigil Honor nomination a Brother must have the following basic requirements: He must have been a Brotherhood member for a minimum of two years when he is selected by the Vigil Committee (which means he must have sealed his vows prior to May 1, 1968) and he must be actively registered in Scouting and in Buckskin Lodge for 1970. If you are not sure a brother meets these minimum requirements To be eligible for Vigil Honor meets these minimum requirements (you may not be sure of his date of Brotherhood) submit his name to the Vigil Chairman and his eligibility will be determined from the Lodge records.
