Conference Delegation.

The date was August 22, 1971. Early that bright Sunday morning two cars departed from Harkness training center with eight of Buckskin's nine delegates to the National Conference at the University of Illinois in Champaign. The first night's stopover on the way out was Sandcrest Scout Camp in Wheeling, West Virginia, where we stayed in the staff lounge. The next day was spent traveling through Ohio and Indiana. A short stop to tour the Air Force museum in Dayton, Ohio, a stopover in Indiana, and we moved on to Champaign, Illinois on Tuesday morning. There we met our ninth delegate, Larry Starr. The Conference officially began that evening for all 5500 attending with a general session of music, songs, Indian ceremonial scenes, and introductions of the Conference administration.

Throughout the Conference, there were several discussion groups that

brothers could attend. The first day's discussions were centered on getting active members in each Lodge. Thid topic involved what was called the "Induction sequence"—a steppingstone to Brotherhood membership that begins with the candidate's election and runs throughout his Ordeal membership, ending finally at his Brotherhood ceremony.

An innovative forum brought out many new ideas that are in store for local O.A. lodges. Lodges sponsored camperships, American Indian projects,

My Brothers,

I've been asked many times why there wasn't any semblance of an optimistic tone in last month's Quill. There was none, because I feel that people, reading the merits and deficiencies of an organization about which there are already hundreds of misconceptions, will naturally choose to remember the strong points and forget the great weaknesses which are debilitating our brotherhood.

For those of you who attended the OSR weekend (150 out of 3000) you heard the first annual Lodge Chief's Inaugural Address. Its purpose is to explain the course of action that will be taken this year. For the benefit of the remaining 2,850 brothers, the programs will be repeated here

One of this year's most extensive programs will be Camp Promotions. The Chairman has pledged his energies to reach every unit in the county as part of the Lodge's obligation to promote camping. But this cannot be accomplished without the help of every brother. The

"Where To Go" camping booklet will be issued for the first time in years.

The Inter-Relations Committee, along with the District Representatives, will sponsor a county-wide clothing drive which will include both Boy Scout and Explorer uniforms; the clothing will be collected on the work-weekends and throughout the year in order to help indigent scouts. This year the committee will work in conjuction with the Big Brothers of Nassau County. Big Brothers serve fatherless boys as big brothers; but this program will also require a great deal of participation on the part of the brothers of Buckskin.

The Home Troop Elections Committee plans to hit every eligible unit in the county for Order of the Arrow elections.

The Ceremonial Costumes committee will be working on two completely new sets of costumes which will take herculean efforts to finish by next summer.

The service committee will once again be working with mentally retarded and physically handicapped troops. A junior leader service corps will be created so that troops in need of assistance can turn to Buckskin for help.

assisting new troops on their first campouts, and even admitting girls to the Order, were subjects that were discussed. It was also discussed whether or not to make it mandatory for lodges to appoint O.A. members to act as representatives on both the Council camping and activities committee, and the Executive Committee.

Discussion groups centering around contemporary problems came up with some ideas on how the arrwoman can practice the principles of the Order outside of Scouting in his community. These groups centered around ecology, drug abuse, inner-city, and reading project "121". Ideas that our Lodge's delegates learned from these discussions will be considered for use in Buckskin Lodge.

Other highlights of the conference included a ceremonial improvement presentation, the "Dur-O-Thin" (O.A. fair), the World Brotherhood rally, the O.A. birthday party (56th year), and several guest appearances by Rewa Walsh, the 1971 Miss Teenage America.

The conference ended on August 28th with an inspiring speech by our founder, Dr. E. Urner Goodman. All arrowmen attending left with some good ideas to put into practice in their home lodges as well as the theme--"Aim High, Serve All." The Buckskin Brothers attending were: Gregory Becker, Arthur Blazer, Gabriel Gluck, James Marrapodi, Mr. Louis Marrapodi, Tom Reinhart, Mr. Russell Rensch, Jr., Mr. Russell Rensch, Sr., and Larry Starr.
