INTRODUCTION

This book was written to provide Scout troops with a guide in planning and preparing their outdoor program. It serves merely as a guide on where to go and does not pretend to provide program ideas. The guide is written with both the backpacker and base camper in mind. It presupposes knowledge of campcraft and hiking as well as other outdoor skills and these skills include, but are not limited to, what to bring on a trip. Most of these skills must be learned by practice and in some cases, bitter experience. Always check in advance regarding places you wish to visit. Never assume that since an area is listed as allowing camping that you will always be accommodated.

ABOUT THIS GUIDE

Since the "Where to Go" guide is intended to assist in camping, only parks which have group camping facilities are listed. Some non-group camping parks are listed only because they are unique in some way.

When using Boy Scout camps or facilities, a unit MUST contact the council, which owns and/or operates the camp. This information is provided with each camp listed. To simply "show up" and expect service is irresponsible. When camping in a state park or preserve be sure to camp only in designated areas and be sure you are in compliance with all regulations of the area. Illegal camping carries very stiff penalties, being a scout troop will not exempt you from these rules and/or penalties.

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

The area discussed in this guide is the B.S.A. Northeast Region and the Northeastern United States. States discussed are Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, and all of New England. In this guide you will find descriptions of Boy Scout camps, state and national facilities.

Section 1 of each chapter always deals with Scout while the remaining sections deal with other facilities. There are no descriptions of private campgrounds since most (but not all) cater to family style camping.

TRAILS AND ABREVIATIONS

As we know most, (but certainly not all) trails are blazed. Most (again, certainly not all) are marked by a color painted on trees or rocks. In some cases metal blazes are affixed to objects. Cairns are sometimes used extensively (a cairn is pile of stones usually shaped like a pyramid).

When referencing a trail the letter in Parenthesis denotes the color. Colors appearing in this guide are:

Example, Batona Trail (P). We know from this that the Batona Trail is pink.

Some trails are abbreviated and shown in their headings thus:

Suffern-Bear Mt. (SBM) (Y) - This tells us that whenever we see SBM (Y), we are referring to the Suffern-Bear Mt. and that it has yellow blazes.

Some trails are not so abbreviated:

Jacob's Ladder Trail (B/Gr) Blazes: Blue and Gray (B/Gr) This means the Jacobs Ladder Trail is marked with blue and gray blazes.

ABBREVIATIONS

In most descriptions and highway directions abbreviations are used to save space and foster readability. It should be noted that nowhere in this guide when we give a direction do we mean the exact compass bearing of that direction, example when we say west, we do not mean exactly 270 degrees. Rather we mean generally west.

A NOTE ON MAPS - No maps are provided in this guide. Trail maps of the New York-New Jersey Trail Conference are very useful when planning outdoor excursions. These are available in waterproof/tear proof editions and cover most of the areas described in this guide in the New York Metropolitan Area. Most of the other outdoor clubs provides similar services. Chapter 1 - BEFORE YOU GO

It is essential that you devote some time to planning your outdoor program and high adventure treks.

SECTION 1.1 TOUR PERMITS AND POLICIES

All units of the Boy Scouts of America must secure the proper tour permits issued by the Theodore Roosevelt Council Service Center (544 Broadway, Massapequa, NY 11758-5010, 516-797-7600, FAX: 797-9765, WEB PAGE: www.trcbsa.com) or the Northeast Region (Jamesburg, NJ). This designates the activity as an official Boy Scout affair and records the event with the council both for the record and for the unit's advantage with regards to insurance coverage. There are two types of tour permit applications, both explained below. Copies are available from the council service center.

LOCAL TOUR PERMIT APPLICATION - BSA NO. 4426 - For all trips with a destination under 500 miles. This form must be filed at the council service center two weeks before a trip.

NATIONAL TOUR PERMIT APPLICATION - BSA NO. 4419A - For all trips with a destination of over 500 miles and for international travel. See Section 1.2. This form must be filed at the council service center one month in advance since the application must be forwarded to the Northeast Region Office in Jamesburg, NJ.

All vehicles MUST be covered by a public liability and property damage liability insurance policy. The amount of this coverage must meet or exceed the insurance requirement of the state in which the vehicle is licensed. (It is recommended, however, that coverage limits are at least \$50,000/\$100,000/\$50,000.) Any vehicle carrying ten (10) or more passengers is required to have limits of \$100,000/\$500,000/ \$100,000. In the case of rented vehicles the requirement of coverage limits can be met by combining the limits of personal coverage carried by the driver with coverage carried by the owner of the rented vehicle. All vehicles used in travel outside the United States must carry a public liability and property damage liability insurance policy that complies with or exceeds the requirements of that country.

The local council may allow a list of the above information to be attached to the permit in order to expedite the process. Each unit may circle the names of the drivers for an event or an activity.

TWO DEEP LEADERS

All troop trips <u>MUST</u> have two adult leaders attending, one of whom <u>MUST</u> be 21 years of age or older.

TIPS ON TRAVEL

- Plan your route with frequent stops if it is a long trip.
- Limit driving to 9 hours in any 24 hour period
- 12 hours should be devoted to rest in any 24-hour period.

If you are planning any rigorous activity, adult participants should not also be drivers since there is an added danger of losing control of the vehicle due to fatigue.

PUBLIC CARRIERS - Public carriers should have required insurance coverage. For more information consult BSA "Tours and Expeditions" No. 3734A for further regulations and suggestions.

ADDITIONAL POLICIES AND SCOUT CONDUCT

Low-Impact Wilderness Use Policy

(Excerpted from "Tours and Expeditions" in condensed form)

- Contact landowner or managing agency well in advance.
- Limit the size of group (8 to 11 persons).
- Match objectives to skill levels. Ruggedness should not exceed group proficiency.
- Hold training sessions.
- Use backpacking stoves where fuel supply is limited
- Leave pets and electronic devices home (radios, TV's etc).
- Carry out unburnable trash. "If you can carry it in you can carry it out."
- Leave area cleaner then you found it.
- Dig shallow holes for latrines 200 feet from water source.
- Conduct all washing 200 feet from water source.
- Do not disturb wildlife or plant life.
- Take nothing but photographs, leave nothing but footprints.

SECTION 1.2 B.S.A. SERVICES AND PROGRAMS - CAMPWAYS

The National Council maintains the Campways service which will on request, furnish information on campgrounds in any part of the country. Although the information is usually out of date it does provide a list of military installations which have accommodations for youth groups.

Campways will also provide a list of historic trails. To use military facilities, contact Campways to find out about military installations in the area you intend to visit.

SECTION 1.4 TRAILS

Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) Blazes: white (W), length 2135 miles fourteen states.

The AT, the most famous long distance footpath (although not the oldest - that honor belongs to the Long Trail of Vermont) runs from Springer Mountain, GA to Mt. Katahdin, Maine. It keeps primarily to the crest of the Appalachian Mountain Range and runs generally in a northeasterly direction. The trail visits the following states: Georgia, Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine.

The highest point is Clingman's Dome (6643 feet) in the Great Smoky Mountains and the lowest is the Bear Mt. Bridge (nearly sea level). Virginia claims the longest mileage, West Virginia the shortest, while Duncannon, Pennsylvania claims to be the mid-point of the entire trail. New Hampshire and Maine have the roughest section (Mahoosuc Notch) while Maine alone is the most remote. New York has the distinction of having the oldest section of the trail (Ramapo-Dunderberg Trail in Harriman State Park). The AT was completed in 1937 after only sixteen years had elapsed since it was initially proposed.

The Appalachian Trail passes near some state parks and scout camps. These are listed in both the facility description and in each trail section.

OTHER INTERSTATE TRAILS IN THE NORTHEAST

Metacomet-Monadnock Trail (simply Metacomet Trail in Ct.)

This trail begins in central Connecticut and travels north keeping to the western ridge of the Connecticut River Valley. It crosses that river in the Northampton, Ma. area and continues north to terminate on Mt. Monadnock in NH.

Long Path (LP) (T) Blazes: Turquoise (T)

The LP was inspired by the Long Trail (LT) of Vermont. The trail begins at the George Washington Bridge and travels northward along the Palisades. It then turns away from the Hudson River and visits Harriman and Catskill State Parks. LP terminates well north of NY 23 (East Windham) in John Boyd Thatcher State Park at the Indian Ladder Trail. Active plans are underway to link up this section with the Northville-Lake Placid Trail.

Shawangunk Ridge Trail portion of the LP was originally intended to by-pass those portions of the trail in Orange County which were being obliterated by advancing suburbia. The Ridge trail extends from High Point, NJ over the Shawangunk Ridge to link up with the LP main at Minnewaska State Park. Major relocations of the LP in Orange County have rendered this an alternate route as well as a new long distance trail.

Mason-Dixon Trail

This trail forms a huge crescent in Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Delaware. It begins on the AT near Harrisburg and travels south to the Chesapeake Bay. The trail then turns east through Delaware and then north and re enters Pennsylvania. Continuing north, the Mason-Dixon terminates on the Horse Shore Trail near Valley Forge.



Chapter 2- Theodore Roosevelt Council, BSA Camps

Schiff Scout Reservation – is a 400 acre camp located in the Long Island Pine Barrens at Wading River. The camp surrounds the 30 acre "Deep Pond", which is a kettle hole famous for its Yellow Perch, Pickerel and Sunfish fishing. In the summer the Deep Pond's pure sand bottom provides a great swimming waterfront. Weekend camping, Project COPE, Cub World cub scout camping.

Onteora Scout Reservation – a 1,400 acre camp located in the Catskill Forest Preserve, approximately 6 miles from the Livingston Manor exit (#96) on NYS Route 17. Located at over 2,000' elevation the camp is heavily forested and features fine Brook Trout fishing in Orchard Lake. The camp is open weekends throughout the year, except during deer season. Boy Scout Summer camp is offered.

Hecksher State Park - East Islip - 516-581-2100

Southern terminus of the 34 mile Suffolk Greenbelt (terminates at the eastern end of Parking Field #8) see Section 3.5. Campsites located in the northern part of the park. Camping in summer only. FEATURES: Camping, hiking, swimming, fishing, and bicycling. DIRECTIONS: Southern State Parkway east to end.

Hither Hills State Park - Montauk - 516-668-3781

This park, located on the south fork near Montauk Point is mostly undeveloped. There are no marked trails and few roads. There are some woods roads. With adjoining Napeague State Park and adjacent Montauk Point State Park, this area can provide a fine variety of wilderness walks. FEATURES: Camping, group camping (out of season), hiking, fishing. DIRECTIONS: NY 27 east.

Wildwood State Park - Wading River - 516-929-4314

Adjoins Camp Baiting Hollow B.S.A. (404). Operates Summer Only. FEATURES: Camping, swimming, hiking, fishing. DIRECTIONS: Long Island Expwy (I-495) E to Exit 69. N to NY 25A. Turn right.

SECTION 3.3 NATIONAL CAMPING FACILITIES

Fire Island National Seashore 120 Laurel Street Patchogue, NY 11772

Camping at Watch Hill is seasonal (May - October). Extending thirty-two miles from Democrat Point in the west to Moriches Inlet in the east, Fire Island offers many outdoor experiences. New York State's only designated wilderness area is located between Watch Hill and Smith Point. The Seashore Trail (when completed) will connect the Suffolk Greenbelt at Montauk Hwy (NY 27A) with Fire Island via the Sayville Ferry. The trail continues east to Smith Point County Park. Turning north the Seashore Trail terminates in Wertheim Wildlife Refuge. FACILITIES: Camping, youth group camping. Instructions: Send self-addressed stamped envelope to:

Fire Island National Seashore 120 Laurel Street, Patchogue, NY 11772. Reservations are by lottery.

DIRECTIONS: Access by ferry only from West Ave in Patchogue. Fire Island National Seashore Ferry 475-1665. I-495 east to Exit 57. Take NY 454 (Vets' Mem Hwy) to Patchogue. Or NY 27 (Sunrise Hwy) east to Exit 52. Turn right onto Waverly Ave - Co Rd 19 and proceed south. Follow Watch Hill Ferry signs and proceed past railroad tracks in Patchogue. Turn right one block past RR. Ferry terminal located here.

SECTION 3.4 NASSAU COUNTY CAMPING FACILITIES

Nassau County maintains three nature preserves all former estates. There is youth group camping in all three areas. A conservation project is required. Bring your own water.

Muttontown Preserve - Muttontown - 922-3123

DIRECTIONS: Proceed south on Muttontown Lane from NY 25A. This is just west of the Junction of NY 106 and 25A in East Norwich.

Sands Point Preserve - Sands Point - 883-1612

Sands Point was once an U.S. Naval Reservation. DIRECTIONS: Long Island Expwy (I-495) to Exit 36. Proceed north on Searingtown Road to NY 101. Continue north on 101 for its entire length. Continue north on Middle Neck Road. Preserve on the right.

Wellwyn Preserve - Glen Cove - 676-1483

Wellwyn is situated on Long Island Sound. DIRECTIONS: Proceed north on Glen Cove Road (Exit 39N on L.I.E.) or NY 107 (Exit 41N on L.I.E). The two roads will converge in Glen Head. Continue north to the end of 107 on Glen Cove Ave. Turn right and proceed three blocks to Cottage Row. Turn left and proceed straight on Cottage Row and then straight onto Roosevelt Street. Proceed to the end and turn right onto Crescent Beach Road. Proceed about a mile. Welwyn is on the right.

Battle Row Campground - Old Bethpage Bethpage-Sweethollow Road (is Bethpage-Spagnoli Road in Suffolk County) 293-7120

This camping area is not really suitable for scouting groups but it is useful for overnight hikers on the Nassau Greenbelt (which you can hike in a day). FACILITIES: Family style campsites. DIRECTIONS: Long Island Expwy (I-495) to Exit 49S. Proceed south on NY 110. Turn right onto the Bethpage-Spagnoli Road. Proceed about a mile and turn left onto Claremont Road. Campground on the right.

SECTION 3.5 HIKING ON LONG ISLAND

There are a surprisingly large number of hiking trails on Long Island. The Long Island Greenbelt Trail Conference maintains and encourages the use of trails on L.I. See Section 3.6. Also consult the *New York Walk Book*. Membership in the conference is \$10.00 per year. To become a member of a hiking club is a worthy service project for any scouting unit.

WARNING; Much of the area described here is made up of low dense brush making it a natural habitat for ticks. Be aware of this while hiking and take proper precautions.

Nassau Greenbelt Trail (W) and Parkway-Tower Loop (B) Greenbelt; Blazes: white (W), length 22 miles

This trail travels through one of the most heavily developed sections of Long Island. Surprisingly enough a walk on the Nassau Greenbelt can be a very pleasant experience as it is very cleverly concealed from suburbia and convenient as it is close to home. The trail begins in Massapequa and travels north ending at Cold Spring Harbor. The Nassau Greenbelt begins on Merrick Road just west of Massapequa Lake. The trail travels north using several paved and unpaved paths in the Massapequa Preserve to the Southern State Parkway. Crossing the Parkway, the trail continues north paralleling the Bethpage State Parkway. This is an interesting part of the trail as it is skillfully hidden from suburbia in the thickets so common to Long Island. The trail at many points along this section is sandwiched between bicycle paths, Bethpage Pkwy, and backyard fences.

Greenbelt traverses the western part of Bethpage State Park (parking available). This part of the trail is an excellent example of the type of forests found on western Long Island. After leaving Bethpage State Park, Greenbelt continues northward through a narrow band of woods to the Long Island Expressway. The terrain to this point is indicative of the southern plain of Long Island prior to development.

Parkway - Tower Loop (B) a blue blazed side trail diverges right and leads to Manetto Hill Park where it links up with the Walt Whiteman trail. Parkway-Tower Loop returns to the Greenbelt just south of the Northern State Parkway. Greenbelt crosses the Northern State at Sunnyside Blvd overpass and immediately turns right into the woods. Continuing north, it crosses Woodbury Road, Jericho Turnpike (NY 25 - parking to the west), and Syosset-Woodbury Road.

Arriving at the Long Island RR, Greenbelt turns right and crosses under the tracks at Apple Hollow Farm before entering Stillwell Woods. From here to Cold Spring Harbor is the most remote section of the entire Nassau Greenbelt.

The trail winds its way through Stillwell Woods, crosses Velsor-Stillwell Road, enters the Franklin Pond Preserve and emerges on NY 108. Here the trail travels through its most

hilly section. Still heading north, Greenbelt passes Upland Farm (yellow blazed side trail diverges right), crosses Lawrence Hill Road and then turn west towards Cold Spring Harbor. Descending steeply, the Nassau Greenbelt terminates on NY 25A about 3/4 mile east of the junction of NY 108 and 25A (parking available).

Camping accommodations can be obtained at Battle Row Campground. Northbound hikers turn right at Hay Path Road and right again at Bethpage Road. Follow to Bethpage-Sweethollow (Spagnoli) Road. Turn right at Claremont Road. Southbound hikers turn left at Bethpage Road.

Walt Whiteman Trail (W/R) Blazes: White with red centers (W/R)

The trail begins at Walt Whitman's birthplace on Old Walt Whitman Road in South Huntington. The trail heads west into West Hills County Park (camping available for Suffolk County Residents), climbs Jayne's Hill (highest point on L.I. - elevation 401 feet), and heads SW and then W towards Mannetto Hill Park. Walt Whitman Trail terminates on Parkway-Tower Loop (B) which connects with the Nassau Greenbelt (W). Left is southbound, right is northbound. Note: There are several spur trails in West Hills.

Suffolk Greenbelt Trail (GBT) (W) Blazes: white (W), length 34 miles

This trail begins at Hecksher State Park at the east end of Parking Field #8. It travels north visiting Connetquot State Park and the headwaters of the Connetquot and Nissequoque Rivers. GBT visits several Suffolk County Parks (camping available for Suffolk County residents) and terminates at Sunken Meadow State Park in Parking Field #3 after descending the famous Cardiac Hill of the cross-country runner.

Ward Pound Ridge Reservation - Cross River 914-763-3493

Extensive trail system. FEATURES: Lean-tos, hiking. DIRECTIONS: Proceed to I-684 as described above. I-684 N to Exit 6. NY 35 east to NY 121. Turn south (right). Turn left.

Chapter 4 - NEW YORK STATE

SECTION 4.1 BOY SCOUT CAMPS IN NEW YORK STATE

The Boy Scout camps described here will include all of New York State excluding New York City and Long Island. Those areas are described in Chapter 3 - New York City and Long Island

SECTION 4.1.1 BOY SCOUT CAMPS IN THE ADIRONDACK AREA

All directions will begin at either the NY Thruway (Interstate 87, Interstate 90 west of Albany) or the Adirondack Northway (Interstate 87). I-87 begins on the Bronx side of the Triboro Bridge. Northway is Exit 24 on the Thruway and this point is just west of Albany. This is where I-87 turns off the Thruway onto the Northway. The Thruway is designated I-90 for the remainder of its length from Exit 24 to Exit 60 (Ripley).

2) State Parks, Forests, and Multiple Use Areas under the auspices of:

This office has jurisdiction over Catskill and Adirondack State Parks in addition to various State Forests and other Multiple Use Areas. Since there are no camping facilities in these areas, they will not be discussed although Eastern Long Island does contain some areas useful for day hiking. Region 3 deals with the Southern Catskills. Region 4 with the Northern and Western Catskills and the Southern Adirondacks. Region 5 deals with the Central Adirondacks, and Region 6 deals with the Southern Adirondacks. Regions 7 - 9 deal with Western New York and will not be described.

Harriman-Bear Mountain State Park - Orange and Rockland Counties

(Part of the Palisades Interstate Park System, PIP)

Harriman and Bear Mountain State Parks operate jointly under both administrations and make up about 75% of the Palisades Interstate Park (PIP). This park system is second to none in the New York Metropolitan Area in its ability to offer a wide variety of outdoor activities. The area is steeped in history and folklore. Still visible are the remains of mines and forges, which provided the shot for the armies of both the Revolutionary and Civil Wars.

There are over 200 miles of backcountry trails and 9 backcountry shelters. The Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) passes for 21 miles through the park. The Long Path (LP) (T) passes for 22 miles through the park. Facilities are spread over 5 recreation areas and one campsite. There are two youth group camping areas. Because of the park's proximity to New York City and Long Island, its features will be discussed at length. For more information consult the *New York Walk Book*.

FEATURES: Camping, activity fields, fishing, swimming, boating, hiking, X-Cntry, ice skating, golf, youth group camping, cabins, backpacking, back country shelters and camping. When not near a shelter, please use fireplaces for fires. There are many fireplaces scattered about the park.

CAMPING AREAS IN HARRIMAN-BEAR MTN STATE PARK

Tiorati Plateau

Group camping area. Located at Lake Tiorati just east of Tiorati Circle (on Seven Lakes Drive) and north of Tiorati Brook Road/Ramapo-Dunderberg Trail (RD) (R). The drive ascends north passing a woods road (no autos) which leads east to a circle, which will be described later. Perkins Drive turns NE, then E, and finally S to the summit of Bear Mountain. A spur road or scenic drive continues SE down the east slope of Bear Mt. and terminates at the Circle mentioned earlier. A woods road (no automobiles permitted) connects the circle with the main Perkins Drive.

BACKCOUNTRY SHELTERS IN HARRIMAN-BEAR MTN.

Park rules require that all backpackers camp in close proximity to the shelters in the park. Heavy fines may be levied for failure to comply (being a Boy Scout troop does not exempt you).

Big Hill Shelter - on Suffern-Bear Mt. (SBM) (Y) trail 0.13 miles south of junction with Long Path (LP) (T). Water: travel N on SBM to stream.

Stone Memorial - on SBM north of junction with Conklin's Crossing (W) east of Pine Meadow Lake just north of rock known as the 'Egg'. View of New York City. Water: in gully

below shelter and from pipe spring on Sherwood Path (woods road) just east of shelter.

Dutch Doctor - Tuxedo-Mt Ivy (TMI) (R) at junction of White Bar (W) and Triangle (Y). West of Seven Lakes Drive at Stony Brook Bridge. Water: From stream west of shelter.

West Mountain - On Timp Torne (TT) (B) east of SBM (Y) and 0.67 miles from AT. View of Hudson Valley and New York City. Accessible from Anthony Wayne Recreation Area via Beechy Bottom, AT, and TT. Water: Stream in Hollow 0.3 miles east of shelter.

Stockbridge Mountain - on Long Path (LP) (T) 2.1 miles south of US 6 at Turkey Hill-Long Mountain Parking Area. Cave Shelter is nearby. Water: East on yellow blazed trail.

William Brien Memorial - on AT-RD at AT 2.1 miles north of Tiorati via RD. Water: available from well southeast of shelter.

Tom Jones - East of RD and North of Victory (B) on south side of Tom Jones Mt.. Excellent views if Skenonto and Sebago Lakes. Water: Available from stream south of shelter.

Black Rock or Bald Rock - On RD just north of Black Rock Mountain 1.4 miles north of Rt. 106, formerly NY 210. Water: available from spring in gully just east of shelter. (May be dry in late summer. If so there is a waterfall about 0.5 miles farther down the gully to the right and beyond the swamp).

Fingerboard - On Hurst Trail (B) 0.02 miles from AT-RD. Hurst Trail descends 0.5 miles to Seven Lakes Drive just south of Tiorati Circle. Tiorati Circle 1.3 miles distant via RD. Water: Available at spring on Hurst Trail. (May be dry in late summer. If so, may be able to take water out of Lake Tiorati).

York Walk Book, 5th ed., 1984 New York-New Jersey Trail Conference, p. 185>. The park comprises nearly 6200 acres and while there is no backcountry camping campsites are secluded enough to give the impression that civilization is far away.

There are two camping areas. Main camping area off NY 301 near the park office not far from the Taconic State Parkway. This facility has individual trailer sites and camp sites. The other area, known as Dennytown Wilderness Camp Ground located at Dennytown is more suited to group camping. South of the park is Clear Lake Scout Reservation (388), accessible via a woods road off of Three Lakes Trail (3L) (B). The Appalachian Trail traverses the park for 10.2 miles and runs near Dennytown Camping Area. For more information, consult the New York Walk Book ant the AT guides. FEATURES: Camping, hiking, boating, swimming, X-Cntry, youth group camping. DIRECTIONS: Bronx River Pkwy N to Sprain Brook Pkwy to Taconic State Parkway. N to NY 301 W-Cold Spring. Commercial vehicles use I-684 N to Exit 10, US 6 W to Carmel. Turn right onto NY 52 and proceed a short distance to NY 301. Turn left and proceed west.

Taconic State Park - Columbia and Dutchess Counties

See campsites listed below for phone numbers.

Taconic Park is situated north of a point where the New York, Massachusetts and Connecticut State lines converge. With the neighboring Mount Washington State Forest in Massachusetts, the park covers part of the Taconic Mountain Range, which extends from the New York/Connecticut area north to southern Vermont where it becomes the Green Mountains. The park and state forests are noted for their water falls deep ravines and gorges. Many trails cross the area. These include the Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) in Massachusetts and Connecticut and the South Taconic Trail (W) which starts in New York just above Rudd Pond near Millerton (iunction US 44 and NY 22) and ends on NY 23 between Hillsdale and the New York - Massachusetts state line. This trail crosses the state line several times on its way from Rudd Pond Road to NY 23. Total trail length is roughly 15 miles (this is the only description of the South Taconic Trail). SECTION 4.2.2.1 CATSKILL STATE PARK

Catskill forms a rough triangle north from Kingston to Catskill and then west to Hancock. The area is administered by the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) which governs by amendment to the New York State Constitution.

Scenic Beauty in the park is breathtaking and outdoor experiences are extensive. There are seven public campgrounds in the park as well as hundreds of miles of trails. Normally open camping is permitted (there are exceptions) except near campgrounds, but campers must observe the following rules (shown here in condensed form):

- 1) Groups of 10 or more MUST have a camping permit from the ranger in whose jurisdiction they expect to camp (this rule is particularly applicable to Scout troops). A complete list of rangers and their jurisdictions appear in the back of the booklet "Use of New York State's Public Forest Lands". This booklet is available from the DEC in Albany or any Region office.
- Camping is prohibited within 150 feet of any road, trail, spring, stream, pond, or body of water except at designated areas.
- 3) Keep a clean camp.
- 4) Remove ALL garbage and refuse. (If you can carry it in, you can carry it out). This rule applies even to refuse which was not left by your group. Follow the outdoor code.
- 5) Emergencies excepted, camping is prohibited between December 21 to March 31 (Dec 15 to April 30 in Adirondack State Park) at an elevation in excess of 3500 feet (4000 feet in Adirondack). Elevations are counted from sea level.
- 6) No open fires in the area described in rule #5. Emergencies excepted.

NOTE: Non compliance with these rules carries very stiff penalties. Being a Scout Troop will not save you. For more information obtain the booklet "Use of New York State's Public Forest Lands" available from the DEC.

SECTION 4.2.2.2 ADIRONDACK STATE PARK

The park occupies three regions of the State Department of Environmental Conservation and operates under constitutional amendment of the Constitution of New York State. This park and Catskill are one of the few state parks to enjoy constitutional protection directly under an article of the state constitution. Lying in regions 4, 5, and 6 (see campsite description) the park occupies almost all of the northeastern New York State. Beginning in Gloversville NW of Albany the park extends northward past Plattsburg almost to the Canadian border and west nearly to Utica in the south and Potsdam in the north. The mountains within the park are the only mountains in the northeastern US which are not part of the Appalachian Mountain Range. The Adirondacks belong to a Canadian Shield, which even now is causing upward doming of these mountains.

There are 40 camping areas within the park. They are located at various parts of the park. Campgrounds listed below. Normally open camping is permitted (there are exceptions) except near campgrounds, but campers must observe the following rules (shown here in condensed form):

- 1) Groups of 10 or more MUST have a camping permit from the ranger in whose jurisdiction they expect to camp (this rule is particularly applicable to Scout troops). A complete list of rangers and their jurisdictions appear in the back of the booklet "Use of New York State's Public Forest Lands". This booklet is available from the DEC in Albany or any Region office.
- Camping is prohibited within 150 feet of any road, trail, spring, stream, pond, or body of water except at designated areas.
- 3) Keep a clean camp.
- 4) Remove ALL garbage and refuse. (If you can carry it in, you can carry it out). This rule applies even to refuse which was not left by your group. Follow the outdoor code.
- 5) Emergencies excepted, camping is prohibited between December 15 to April 30 (Dec 21 to March 31 in Catskill State Park) at an elevation in excess of 4000 feet (3500 feet in Catskill). Elevations are counted from sea level.
- 6) No open fires in the areas described in rule #5. Emergencies excepted.

NOTE: Non compliance with these rules carries very stiff penalties. Being a Scout troop will not save you. For more information obtain the booklet "Use of New York State's Public Forest Lands" available from the DEC.

It is hoped that this trail may someday be linked with the Long Path (LP) (T) that will constitute a continuous footpath from the George Washington Bridge to Lake Placid. Significant also is that this will provide a link with the North Country Trail, which if ever completed will stretch from Vermont to North Dakota.

The Trail starts at Northville NY (NY Thruway to Exit 27 NY 30 N) and winds its way north through the low southern foothills of the Adirondacks over some high peaks and terminates at Lake Placid. SECTION 4.2.2.3 MULTIPLE USE AREAS (MUA)

Multiple Use Areas are state lands, which are maintained for a variety of uses. These uses can include, but are not limited to, primitive camping, hunting, and off road vehicle recreation. Rules for camping on a Multiple Use Area are the same as for using a State Forest Preserve. You must notify the ranger under whose jurisdiction you intend to camp if your group is over a certain size. For more information, consult "Use of New York State's Public Forest Lands" available from the DEC. For more information contact the DEC.

SECTION 4.3 TRAILS IN NEW YORK STATE

Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) in New York Blazes: white (W), length 90 miles in New York

The Appalachian Trail enters New York just to the west of Greenwood Lake. It is connected to NY 210 and Co Rd 511 by the State Line Trail (B). The AT runs north from the state line over Mt. Peter and then traverses Sterling Forest. The trail then enters Harriman State Park and crosses the park to Bear Mt.. Crossing the Bear Mt.. Bridge (lowest point on the entire AT); the trail then climbs Anthonies Nose. Proceeding NE, the AT crosses Canada Hill, US 9 and then enters

Fahnestock State Park. Continuing NE the trail traverses Fahnestock, crosses Hosner Mt.., I-84, NY 55 and then descends to NY 22 just north of Pawling. Still travelling NE, the trail enters Connecticut. For CT description see Trails in Connecticut Chapter 6 Section 6.3.

Long Path (LP) (T) in New York Blazes: Turquoise (T), length 128 miles in New York (11.9 miles in New Jersey)

For New Jersey section of the LP see Trails Section in New Jersey Chapter 5 Section 5.4. The LP begins at the George Washington Bridge and proceeds north to the Catskills. It runs along the top of the famous Palisade cliffs as far as the NY/NJ state line. The trail continues north through Tallman Mountain, Blauvelt, Hook Mountain/Rockland Lake, and High Tor State Parks before entering Harriman State Park. Traversing the park, the LP meets the Appalachian Trail and continues north passing through Central Valley after leaving Harriman. LP then climbs and descends Schunemunk Mountain before angling to the NW through Minnewaska State Park (no camping) near the famous Lake Mohonk Preserve. LP then enters Catskill State Park at Peekamoose. Camping is allowed only where the trail traverses state parks and is subject to the regulations of that park. Camping is not allowed at the following state parks traversed by the LP; Tallman Mt.., Blauvelt, Hook Mt./Rockland Lake, High Tor, and Minnewaska State Parks. Camping is allowed in New Jersey at two B.S.A. camps.

Shawangunk Ridge Trail portion of the LP was originally intended to by-pass those portions of the trail in Orange County which were being obliterated by advancing suburbia. The Ridge trail extends from High Point, NJ over the Shawangunk Ridge to link up with the LP main at Minnewaska State Park. Major relocations of the LP in Orange County have rendered this an alternate route as well as a new long distance trail.

LP terminates well north of NY 23 (East Windham) in John Boyd Thatcher State Park at the Indian Ladder Trail. Active plans are underway to link up this section with the Northville-Lake Placid Trail. For more information consult the *Guide to the Long Path*, 1996 Fourth Edition.

SECTION 5.1.1 BSA CAMPS - NORTHERN NEW JERSEY

Alpine Scout Camp - Alpine

Alpine Scout Camp is conveniently located near the Palisades Interstate Parkway, just 15 minutes from the George Washington Bridge. This large camp offers much for the weekend camper. Along with weekend camping, Alpine is ideal for day hikes. The 5 mile Red Dot Trail that encircles the camp provides a good hiking experience. Also the Palisades at the State Line Lookout are accessible via a foot bridge, over the Palisades Parkway. DIRECTIONS: George Washington Bridge (upper level) stay right exit onto Palisades Parkway. Proceed north past Exit 3 (State Line Lookout). Take the Turnaround and first exit. Alpine is straight ahead.

It ends on US 9W just south of the GNYC trail overpasses, which lead to The Castle and the LP. FEATURES: Tent sites lean-tos, activity fields. DIRECTIONS: George Washington Bridge to US 9W or Palisades Parkway North. Exit 2 of Palisades Pkwy. Proceed on Closter Dock Road to Piermont Rd, turn right, proceed about 1 mile, turn right again onto Ruckman Rd, proceed to camp.

FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos, cabins, boating. DIRECTIONS: I-80 west to Exit 37. East on US 46 to Denville exit (NJ 53 north). Turn right at second traffic light. Proceed 3.2 miles on Diamond Spring Road will become Rockaway Valley Road. Turn left onto Farber Hill Road. Proceed 0.75 miles. Camp on left.

Camp Lewis - Marcella

This camp is located near two major ski areas, Vernon Valley and Great Gorge. It is also close to New York City making inexpensive ski weekends possible. Camp Lewis also has a rifle range available to units who supply a qualified NRA instructor and who is present when the range is in use. SECTION 5.2.1 NORTHERN NEW JERSEY

Cheesequake State Park - Middlesex County - 300 Grodon Road, Matawan, NJ 07747 -732-566-2161 (Apr1 - Oct 31)

A 3.5-mile perimeter trail rings the park. This trail provides a look at some of the historical clay mining spoils, which once supported the pottery industry in New Jersey. Group camping is available in a field in the park. FEATURES: Group camping, fishing, swimming. DIRECTIONS: From Verrazano Bridge I-278 west to NY 440 to Outerbridge Crossing into New Jersey.

Continue on NJ 440 to Garden State Parkway. South to Exit 120. Commercial traffic use US 9 and NJ 34.

Wawayanda State Park - Sussex County PO Box 198 Highland Lakes, NJ 07422 973-853-4462 (Apr 1 – Oct 31)

Located in northern New Jersey between Ringwood and Vernon, the park is situated in very hilly terrain. Near the wilderness group camping area is Ames Charcoal Blast Furnace, built in 1845-1846. The camping area is just E of the Furnace, which is located on the camping area access road. The park has many miles of hiking trails some of which link up with the Appalachian Trail. Some of these trails will be discussed below. By using these trails in conjunction with the camping area it is possible to backpack in the park. Form more information, consult the New Jersev Walk Book. FEATURES: Hiking, boating, fishing, and a wilderness group camp. DIRECTIONS: From George Washington Bridge proceed west on NJ 4 to NJ 208 to I-287. Exit at Skyline Drive and proceed to Co Rd 511. Continue past Greenwood and Upper Greenwood Lakes Continue along Warwick Turnpike disregarding 511 (which will turn right at Greenwood Lake). Park entrance on the left.

The Park Road leaves Warwick Turnpike 1 mile north of Upper Greenwood Lake. Road goes past Park office (parking available here) and continues to the beach, about 2 1/2 miles. About 1 1/2 miles past park building the road to the Wilderness Camp Area diverges left just past a concrete bridge.

High Point State Park - Sussex, Sussex County (Apr 1 – Oct 31)

High Point (elev. 1803 – highest point in NJ) and the highest lake, Lake Marcia are located in this park. There is a system of eight trails varying in length from half a mile to four miles. Stokes State Forest is located southwest of High Point and straddles the Kittatiny Mountain Ridge. There are eighteen marked trails within the forest including the Appalachian Trail (AT) (W). Kittatiny Scout Reservation (352) is centrally located just off US 206. For more information on hiking, consult the *New Jersey Walk Book*. FEATURES: Camping, group camping, cabins, fishing, swimming, wilderness camping and shelters on AT only. DIRECTIONS: From George Washington Bridge, I-80 west to Exit 34B. Take NJ 15 north to US 206 north to Culvers Gap.

CAMPSITES IN STOKES STATE FOREST - Campsites available at the following areas. Some roads within the forest are closed in winter, (ex. Sunrise Mountain Road.)

Shotwell - Near the forest office and at the end of Tibbs Trail marked Blue and Green (B/G).

Steam Mill - Camping area on Crigger Road. Accessible from US 206 via Flatbrook Road and Gran Road. Also located on the Parker Trail (B).

Lake Ocquittunk - Area situated on the lake, which bears its name. Trailer sites as well as cabins. It is located at the intersection of Flatbrook, Gran, and Skellinger Roads. Both Tinsley and Blue Mountain trailheads are on Skellinger Road.

Haskins - Group camping area sites capable of handling between 50 and 100 people. This area is on Kittle Road, just off Flatbrook Road, which is just E of US 206.

Located at the southern end of the Appalachian Trail (AT), in the New Jersey Kittatiny Mountain Ridge and is wholly within the Delaware Recreation Area. The Appalachian Trail traverses the forest just prior to its exiting of New Jersey into Pennsylvania. Formal facilities operate from April 1 to December 31. For AT description consult the Appalachian Trail Guide to New York-New Jersey, Vol. 4. FEATURES: Boating, camping, swimming, wilderness campsites on AT. DIRECTIONS: From George Washington Bridge take I-80 to Evit 1

Jenny Jump State Forest - west of Hackettstown, Warren County. (Apr 1 – Oct 31)

Located in Western New Jersey, the forest is so named because Jenny Jump Mountain lies within its boundaries. Numerous hiking opportunities with spectacular views of the Delaware River Valley and beyond can be found within the forest. FEATURES: Camping, hiking. DIRECTIONS: From George Washington Bridge, west on I-80 to Exit 12. Left on

Co Rd 521 south through Hope. Turn left onto Co Rd 519 proceed 1 mile. Turn right where marked.

Round Valley Recreation Area - near Clinton, Hunterdon County (Apr 1 – Oct 31)

Round Valley is located in west central New Jersey, not far from Clinton. There are a variety of outdoor opportunities. The Round Valley Trail (9 miles long) runs along the crest of this ridge accessing a wilderness area campsite. The area also provides many campsites on the shore of the reservoir. Allamuchy Mountain State Park is an undeveloped state park bisected by I-80 just west of Netcong. Hiking opportunities are numerous in the park. The area also includes the Waterloo village restoration, which commemorates the historic village on the Morris Canal (which ran from Newark to Phillipsburg). The Park also surrounds Mt. Allamuchy Scout Reservation operated by Patriots Path Council (343). Camping cam be found in Stephens State Park at the south end of Allamuchy. Open April through October. FEATURES: Fishing, 50 campsites. DIRECTIONS: From George Washington Bridge take I-80 to Exit 19.

SECTION 5.2.2 THE PINE BARRENS AND SOUTHERN NEW JERSEY

The Pine Barrens are vast near arid areas of pitch pine, which cover most of South Central New Jersey. This phenomenon

occurs in about only twenty other areas of the world, nearly all of them in the northeastern United States. Some other areas of note are Cape Cod and Eastern Long Island. Eastern L.I. is discussed in Chapter 3. Although pine barrens are semi arid they form a protective cover for vast underground fresh water supplies. If only for their unusual characteristics, these regions are worth a visit. <Lawrence Paul, *Pine Barrens of Ronkonkoma*, 1986 New York-New Jersey Trail Conference, Page 1.>

WARNING: As Pine Barrens are made up of low dense brush, they are an ideal habitat for ticks. Be aware of this while hiking and camping and take proper precautions.

Allaire State Park - Monmouth County

Offers the wilderness experience of the Pine Barrens while being located near the shore. Facilities are not really suitable for scouting activities. FEATURES: Camping, swimming, boating. DIRECTIONS: Garden State Parkway south to Exit 98. I-195 west to Exit 31. Co Rd 547 north. Turn right onto Co Rd 524

Bass River State Park - Ocean and Burlington Counties

Located at the southern terminus of the Batona Trail, this park encompasses over 14,000 acres of the Pine Barrens. There is a guided nature trail. Camping is available at Lake Absegami (State Forest Headquarters). The Batona Trail has only recently been extended into the Forest. As of this writing there may be no wilderness camping areas on the trail. FEATURES: Camping, swimming, boating, fishing, and cabins. DIRECTIONS: Garden State Parkway south to Exit 52 (East Greenbush Road). Commercial traffic use US 9 south to East Greenbush Road.

Wharton State Forest - Atlantic, Burlington, and Camden Counties

Batsto Road 4 Hammonton NJ 08037 609-561-3262

Covers over 100,000 acres of the New Jersey Pine Barrens. Located in the south-central part of the state 8 miles west of Garden State Parkway, north of Mullica Road and straddling US 206.

The forest offers much in history and activities. The Batona Trail traverses the forest for much of its length. The trail enters the forest at Apple Pie Hill and proceeds south to Batsto, then swings E and exits the forest at Evans Bridge. Wilderness campsites for Batona Trail available at Batona Camp, Lower Forge, and Godfrey Bridge. (Autos not permitted at Lower Forge). Other camping areas are located at Atsian Lake, Goshen Pond, Mullica River, Buttonweed Hill, Hawkin Bridge, and Bodine Field. For more information consult the New Jersey Walk Book.

Four rivers flow through the forest making canoeing possible. These rivers are Mullica River and its tributary, Atsian Branch, Batsto, Nescochague Creek, and Wading River. There are

several campsites located on these rivers. These may be used for overnight canoe trips. Atsian Lake Camp is on the Atsian Branch of Mullica River. Mullica River Camp also serves this river 6 miles below (southeast) of Atsian. Buttonwood Hill Camp is located at the junction of Batsto River, Nescochaque Creek and Atsian Branch of Mullica River at Batsto. Mullica River Proper starts here. For more information consult Canoeing in the Jersey Pine Barrens. FEATURES: Camping, backcountry camping, canoe camping, hiking, swimming, boating, fishing. DIRECTIONS: Because of the vastness of the forest, a description of a single route is impractical. Generally the north and west edge are best approached by US 206 south from Exit 7 on New Jersey Turnpike. South and east are best approached from Garden State Parkway Exit 52. (Commercial traffic use US 9) and Co Rd 542 west from New Gretna. Headquarters are located at Batsto on Co Rd 542 10 miles east of the junction of US 206 and US 30. The office is 13 miles west of New Gretna.

Lebanon State Forest - Burlington and Ocean Counties (Mar 1 – Nov 30)

Located at the northern fringe of the Pine Barrens. The forest is honeycombed with trails and jeep sand roads, which can provide many hiking opportunities. It is also the northern terminus of Batona Trail (P) which terminates at Ongs Hat on the Pemberton Road 2 miles northwest of 4 Mile Circle on NJ 72. Camping near Pakim Pond which is mile 8 on Batona Trail . Open from March 1 to November 30. Consult *New Jersey Walk Book.* FEATURES: Camping, swimming, and hiking. DIRECTIONS: Garden State Parkway south to Exit 88 (US 9 south). NJ 70 west to 4 Mile Circle, about 26 miles.

Parvin State Park - Salem County (Mar 1 – Nov 30)

FEATURES: Group camping, camping, hiking, boating, swimming. DIRECTIONS: New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 2, US 322 east to NJ 77 south to Deerfield Co Rd 540 east.

Located near, but not on the Cape May peninsula, this Forest offers hiking and nature trails and a lodge, which can accommodate 24 persons. North on US 9, then west on Co Rd 550. Commercial traffic use US 9.

Proceed north on US 209 to Bushkill. Turn onto Hidden Lake Drive and proceed 2 miles. For River's Bend I-80 west in NJ to Exit 1. Proceed along the river for 14 miles.

SECTION 5.4 NEW JERSEY TRAILS

Ringwood State Park Ramapo Mountain State Forest Ramapo Valley County Reservation - all in Passaic and Bergen Counties

No camping in these three areas. They are listed because there are many miles of trails and Camp Yaw Paw (333).

These three areas are situated all next to each other in lower Sterling Forest on the ridge east and north of Wanaque Reservoir. Although there are no state camping facilities, there are many miles of hiking trails, which pass near Camp Yaw Paw of Northern New Jersey Council (333). Backpacking trips or day hikes to and from this camp are simple to plan. Additionally, Ramapo County Park Trailheads on US 202 are only 3 miles by road from the southern terminus of Suffern-Bear Mountain Trail (SBM) (Y) in Harriman State Park, New York. See Chapter 4, Section 4.2.1.

TRAILS

Hoeferlin Memorial Trail (Y) and Lookout Trail (R)

Hoeferlin Memorial Trail (14 miles) Blazes: Yellow (Y) Lookout Trail (2.3 miles) Blazes: Red (R)

The Hoeferlin Memorial Trail travels from Oakland, NJ north to Bear Swamp Lake in Ringwood SP (Construction Of I-287 through the area has obliterated the northern section to Suffern NY.) The trail begins on the right side of Pool Hollow Road immediately off West Oakland Avenue (West Oakland Ave begins opposite Skyline Drive I-287, Exit 57). The trails travels along the old Cannonball Connector to the Cannonball Trail (W/R). Hoeferlin Trail merges with Cannonball and both cross I-287 on a pedestrian overpass. Hoeferlin turns right soon after the overpass and crosses a gravel road and continues north over several rock ledges. The Lookout Trail (R) enters from the right. To the right, the Lookout Trail crosses some ledges, which give some fine views of Oakland and Pompton Lakes. It then descends to join the Hoeferlin Trail at the outlet by Ramapo Lake Dam. To continue straight, the Hoeferlin and Lookout trails descend to Ramapo Lake where the Lookout Trail terminates at the gravel road on the

lake shore. Hoeferlin turns right and proceeds to the dam at the end of the lake, here it meets the other end of the Lookout Trail mentioned above. After crossing the Ramapo Lake Dam, the Hoeferlin Trail crosses the MacEvoy Trail (B) (not described) and then begins to ascend using blacktop, gravel and woods roads before emerging on Skyline Drive opposite the entrance to the defunct Camp Tamarack BSA. Hoeferlin Trail then crosses Skyline Drive and climbs steeply to the top of a ledge offering good views east. The trail then parallels Skyline Drive to the junction with Cannonball Trail (W/R). Cannonball and Hoeferlin Trail proceed north jointly for 1.75 miles skirting Skyline Drive and then leaving the road behind the trails head north skirting the former BSA Camp Glen Gray. Here the trails divide, Cannonball diverges right, Hoeferlin left, and continues north to Ringwood Ramapo Trail (R), which diverges, left. Hoeferlin goes right and enters Camp Yaw Paw BSA (333). Yaw Paw Orange Trail (O) diverges right in a short distance later Green trail diverges R. both entering Yaw Paw west into Ringwood State Park merges with Crossover Trail (W) which enters from right. Both proceed jointly past Ilgehstein Rock (views E over bear Swamp Lake). Crossover Trail diverges left and Hoeferlin continues north. Hoeferlin Trail descends to north end of Bear Swamp Lake and terminates on the Shore Trail (B). Shore Trial runs along the shore of Bear Swamp Lake.

Halifax Trail (G) Blazes: green (G) (6 miles).

Halifax trail begins on Crossover Trail (W) in Ringwood State Park E of Sloatsburg Road. The Halifax Trail climbs an arm of Mount Defiance by Ringwood-Ramapo Trail (R) and then descends on switch backs to Glasmere Ponds. The trail then crosses over Pierson Ridge and then descends to Bear Swamp. The trail encounters the north end of the Shore Trail (B) which runs along the shore of Bear Swamp Lake to the south. Entering Ramapo County Reservation, The Halifax Trail continues through Havemeyer Hollow and past Havermeyer Reservoir (named for a onetime owner of the valley). The trail then turns south and while paralleling the Ramapo River a lava butte is encountered. Halifax Trail terminates on Silver Trail (S), which leads, left to US 202.

Cannonball Trail (W/R) Blazes: White C on Red (W/R), length 8.5 miles.

The Cannonball Trail is so named since it was used during the Revolution to transport cannonballs from Pompton Lakes into Smith's Clove, New York. The trail begins at the end of Barbara Drive in Pompton Lakes off West Oakland Avenue (West Oakland Ave proceeds south from the point where Skyline Drive meets NJ 208). Cannonball goes through a town park and proceeds along the Du Pont plant fence. Joining a woods road the trail arrives at the junction with the Hoeferlin Trail. Cannonball and Hoeferlin Trails cross Interstate 287 on a pedestrian overpass. After the overpass Hoeferlin diverges right and Cannonball left. The trail continues along the west shore of Ramapo Lake on a gravel road past a ranger station over an arm of the lake. Shortly after this is the junction of MacEvoy Trail (B) (not described here) which diverges left and also proceeds straight jointly with Cannonball. Cannonball continues north to a junction with Castle Point Trail (W), which diverges, left and proceeds to a former mansion. Cannonball/MacEvoy continue on for a short distance and then divide. Cannonball turns left and begins to ascend a ridge. Castle Point Trail (W) (not described here) diverges left just before Skyline Drive which is reached at mile 3.5. Cannonball trail crosses the drive and joins the Hoeferlin Trail, which it follows jointly for 1.75 miles. The Trails then head north skirting the now defunct BSA Camp Glen Gray. The trails then divide with Hoeferlin proceeding left and Cannonball right. The Cannonball then enters the former Camp Glen Gray, now a county park. Cannonball Trail continues through Camp Yaw Paw (333), passes into Ringwood State Park and then meets the Crossover Trail terminus (W), which enters from the left. Cannonball then descends to Bear Swamp Lake and terminates on the Shore Trail (B) which runs along the shore of the lake.

Ringwood-Ramapo Trail (R) Blazes: red (R), length 10.5 miles.

The Ringwood-Ramapo Trail begins in Ramapo Mountain State Forest and runs northwest deep into Ringwood State Park. The trail begins on the Hoeferlin Trail (Y) about 0.3 miles beyond Hoeferlin/Cannonball (R) split on the ridge near the former BSA Camp Glen Gray. The trail proceeds north along the state park boundary line with Camp Yaw Paw (333) and then descends west to High Mountain Brook before turning north again. Paralleling High Mountain Brook for 3/4 mile the trail then enters Ringwood State Park still proceeding north along High Mountain Brook. It then swings left and proceeds northwest ascending Mount Defiance and passes a rock ledge lookout called Warm Puppy. A short distance later the trail meets the Crossover Trail (W) and continues along the ridge of Mount Defiance crossing Halifax Trail (G) and reaches the summit of Mount Defiance (1100 ft). The trail then descends steeply and crosses an unnamed summit before descending to the shores of Sheppard Lake. Turning west along Sheppard Lake, the trail reaches Sheppard Pond Road (Parking available). Continuing west the trail crosses Cupsaw Brook (B) and Cooper Union (Y) Trails (not described) before terminating on the Sloatsburg Road. (Left to Co Rd 511, right to NY 17 in Sloatsburg Ringwood Manor.) This road is also known as Sterling Lake Road.

GREEN TRAIL (BSA) (G) Blazes: Green (G), length 0.5 miles.

Connects Hoeferlin trail (R) with Cannonball Trail in Camp Yaw Paw (333).

Crossover Trail (W) Blazes: White (W), length 6 miles.

The Crossover Trail Leaves left from Cannonball Trail (R) just north of Cannonball Lake and Camp Yaw Paw BSA. The trail climbs northwest meeting the Hoeferlin Trail (Y), which diverges left. The two trails jointly cross Ilgenstein Rock and then divide a short distance later with Crossover turning left and heading northwest towards Pierson Ridge. Pierson Ridge Trail (B) Diverges right and runs on top of Pierson Ridge to connect with Halifax Trail (G). Zigzagging northwest, Crossover skirts Gatum Pond and climbs the southern arm of Mount Defiance. The Ringwood-Ramapo Trail (R) crosses on top. Crossover continues west and then north descending past Swan Pond. The Halifax Trail (G) diverges right and leads past the summit of Mount Defiance. Crossover turns west leading past Skylands Manor (worth a look). The trail continues to Sheppard Pond Road (Parking available here) at Morris Ave intersection and continues west and then north meeting Morris Ave a second time (Parking available here). Crossover continues west to connect with Cooper Union (Y) (not described) and turns north with Cooper Union (Y), crosses Morris Ave and then diverges left heading northwest terminating with Ringwood-Ramapo Trail (R) at Ringwood Manor on the Sloatsburg Road. Left on Sloatsburg for Co Rd 511, right for NY 17 at Sloatsburg (also known as Sterling Lake Road).

SILVER TRAIL (S) Blazes: Silver (S), length 2 miles.

The Silver Trail begins at the parking area of Ramapo Valley County Reservation off US 202 just south of West Mahwah. The trail crosses Ramapo River immediately. Halifax Trail (G) (may be unmarked), diverges right just after crossing the river. Silver continues past Scarlet Oak Pond where several marked trails diverge and then return. Ridge Trail (B) diverges right and climbs Monroe Ridge and then rejoins Silver Trail later on. Silver Trail continues west ascending to MacMillan Reservoir passing Yellow-Silver (Y/S) which leaves left. The trail then arrives at the junction with Yellow Trail (Y), which diverges, left just past the reservoir. Yellow Trail is a good access to BSA Camps Yaw Paw (333). Silver proceeds to and terminates at the junction of Ridge (B) and Red-Silver (R/S) Trails.

RED-SILVER TRAIL (R/S) Blazes: Red and Silver (R/S), length (1 mile).

Skirting Rocky Mountain this trail connects the Silver Trail (S) with the Cannonball Trail (R) at Bear Swamp Lake.

Todd Trail (W) Blazes: White (W), length 2.2 miles.

The Todd Trail leaves MacEvoy Trail (B) (not described) 500 feet E of Ramapo Lake and Hoeferlin Trail (Y). The Todd Trail runs north over Skyline Drive along the edge of the ridge to where it meets Yellow Trail (Y) near Todd Lake. Todd Trail turns west and proceeds to the gate of the defunct Camp Tammarak on Skyline Drive (P), where it meets the Hoeferlin Trail (Y).

Palisades Interstate Park (PIP) - Bergen County

No camping in New Jersey. This unique park system includes many State Parks in both New York and New Jersey. These include Rockland Lake, Blauvelt, Tallman Mountain, and Harriman-Bear Mountain in New York. In New Jersey the park was organized to protect the famous Palisades Cliffs known simply as the Palisades from quarrymen. Although there is no camping in New Jersey the park is traversed by the Long Path (LP) (B) and there are two Boy Scout camps at and near its northern end. These camps both known as Camp Alpine are operated respectively by Northern New Jersey Council (333) and Greater New York Councils (GNYC) (640). Trails run on both the top and the bottom of the cliffs. The LP runs on the top of the cliffs. Cross country skiing is available through a private vendor at State Line Lookout - Palisade Pkwy Exit 3. FEATURES: Hiking, x-Cntry.

Long Path (LP) (T) Blazes: turquoise (T), length 11.2 miles in New Jersey

The Long Trail in Vermont inspired the idea for the Long Path. When the property for the Palisades Interstate Parkway was acquired in 1935, the way was open for New York and New Jersey to create their own Long Path. When completed, the path will run from the George Washington Bridge on the New Jersey side to the southern terminus of the Northville-Lake Placid Trail in New York. Currently the Long Path is not completed across the Mohawk Valley. The trail now runs from the George Washington Bridge through Catskill State Park. LP terminates well north of NY 23 (East Windham) in John Boyd Thatcher State Park at the Indain Ladder Trail. Active plans are underway to link up this section with the Northville-Lake Placid Trail.

The trail in New Jersey is of particular interest to Scouts since two Boy Scout camps are located near the trail. Both called Alpine, one is operated by Greater New York Councils (GNYC) (640), the other by Northern New Jersey Council (333). The LP runs on the top of the Palisades but there is a lower trail, which runs along the riverbank. A patch and medal were available from the former Bergen Council for completing a walk on both trails. Contact Northern New Jersey Council for information and to ascertain if this program is still current. Consult the New York Walk Book and the Guide to the Long Path.

The southern terminus of the Long Path is easily accessible by public transportation. Near the New York side of the GW Bridge, is the 175th St. subway station (A train) in upper Manhattan. The A train connects directly with the Long Island Railroad, Amtrak, New Jersey Transit, all in Penn Station). With the walkway on the GW Bridge itself, this can provide an interesting trip.

DIRECTIONS: From the north walkway of the GW Bridge or the Stairway on Hudson Terrace, proceed north on the Long Path (LP) (T). From Upper Level on the GW Bridge, take second exit marked US 9W-NJ 67. Immediately after exiting turn sharply right where marked Hudson Terrace. Proceed to the end of the ramp. Stairway is across the street. No long term parking.

Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) Blazes: white (W), length 73.6 miles in New Jersey.

The Appalachian Trail in New Jersey covers 73 miles from the Delaware Water Gap to the State Line Trail just above Greenwood Lake on the New York/New Jersey state line. From the Gap the trail travels northeast on the Kittatiny Ridge. AT Crosses High Point (highest point in New Jersey, elevation 1,803 ft). From High Point the Trail turns southeast, crosses the Walkill River and climbs the ridge above Greenwood Lake. It then turns north into New York.

Batona Trail (P) Blazes: Pink (P), length 40 miles.

The Batona is the longest trail in southern New Jersey. Since it covers ground in the Pine Barrens it is a very level although sandy route. It begins at Ongs Hat in Lebanon State Forest and travels south into Wharton State Forest. It then turns east on a new section and enters Bass River State Forest. Since the Batona Hiking Club of Philadelphia maintains the trail, there is a description in *Pennsylvania Hiking Trails*. Consult this and the *New York Walk Book*.

SECTION 6.1 BOY SCOUT CAMPS IN CONNECTICUT

Ernest Thompson Seton Scout Reservation - Greenwich (Seton)

Greenwich (67) 63 Mason Street Greenwich, Ct. 06830 203-869-8424

Henry David Thoreau would feel quite at home in this camp. It is the opinion of the writer that the pond located in E.T. Seton surpasses the actual Walden Pond in scenic beauty. The camp is an island in suburbia situated on 248 wooded acres in the Glenville section of Greenwich, Ct. The short-term camping season is September through May. FEATURES: Cabins, day hiking, bicycling, boating, Cub Scout summer program. Directions: Hutchinson River Parkway to King Street, Exit 30. North on NY/CT 120A. Turn right onto Sherwood Ave. Turn left onto Riversville Road. Camp is sixth driveway on right. Commercial vehicles use I-95 to Exit 20. US 1 north into Port Chester. Turn left on King Street. Proceed on 120A as described above.

Camp Mattatuck - Plymouth

Connecticut Rivers (66) 60 Darlin Street PO Box 280098 E. Hartford, Ct. 06128-0098 860-414-2433

Mattatuck Trail passes near the camp. FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos, cabins, boating, summer program, Cub Scout program. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 27A. CT 8 N to Exit 37. Turn right onto CT 262 and follow to Mt. Tobe Road. Follow to camp.

Camp Nahaco - Eastford

Connecticut Rivers (66) (See Camp Mattatuck above for address.)

Camp is situated one mile north of the Natchaug Trail via the Ashford Road. The camp itself is located on Crystal Pond in the rolling hill country side typical of eastern Connecticut. FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos, cabins, activity field, Cub Scout program. Directions: I-95 to Exit 48. I-91 N to Hartford. I-84 E to Exit 69. CT 74 E to US 44. 44 E to Phoenixville. Proceed N on CT 198. Turn left at Eastford onto Eastford-Westford Road.

Camp Tadma - Bozrah

Connecticut Rivers (66) (See Camp Mattatuck above for address.)

FEATURES/ACITIVITIES: Tent sites, activity field, cabins, boating, summer program. Directions: I-95 N to I-395. N to Exit 80. W on CT 82, 2 miles. R on South Road. R again on Bishop Road. Camp on right.

Camp Workcoeman - New Hartford

Connecticut Rivers (66) (See Camp Mattatuck above for address.)

Located on West Hill Pond in northern Connecticut near Winsted. FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos, cabins, activity field, boating, summer program, Cub Scout program. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 27A. CT 8 N to Exit 46. Turn east to CT 163. Proceed N on 163 for .5 miles. Turn R and proceed past Camp Sequassen. Turn L.

Camp Cochegan Rock - Montville

Connecticut Rivers (66) (See Camp Mattatuck above for address.)

The largest freestanding boulder in the United States can be found in this in this 100-acre camp. Primitive camping only. Bring your own water or obtain it from a nearby state garage. FEATURES: Tent sites. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 76. I-395 N to Exit 79. CT 163 N.

June Norcross Webster Scout Reservation - Ashford (J. N. Webster)

Connecticut Rivers (66) (See Camp Mattatuck above for address.)

J. N. Webster is near the Natchaug Trail where it crosses US 44. Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book*. FEATURES: Tent sites, activity field, boating, summer program, Cub Scout program. Directions: I-84 E to Exit 69. CT 74 E to US 44. 44 east to Asford. Camp is on 44.

Camp Wakenah - Salem

Connecticut Rivers (66) (See Camp Mattatuck above for address.)

FEATURES: Tent sites, cabins, activity field, Cub Scout program. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 70. CT 156 N to CT 82. East on 82 for 6 miles to CT 354. Turn left, proceed 0.5 mile and turn right onto Forest Drive. Camp on right.

Housatonic (69) 326 Derby Ave Derby, Ct. 06418 203-734-3329 FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos, cabins, boating, activity field, summer program. Directions: I-95 north to Exit 27A. CT 8 north to Exit 44. West on CT 4. for 6 miles to Goshen. Turn right onto CT 63, proceed north about a mile. Turn left onto West Side Road. Proceed one mile. Camp on right.

Camp Deer Lake - Killingworth Camp Sequassen - New Hartford

Connecticut Yankee (72) 70 Wellington Road PO Box 32 Milford, Ct 06460-0032 203-876-6868

Deer Lake is located close to Cockaponset State Forest. FEATURES: Tent sites, cabins, activity field, boating, summer program. Sequassen also has Cub Scout program. Directions: I-95 N. For Deer Lake use Exit 61. CT 79 north 1 mile. Turn R onto Green Hill Road. Proceed 1.75 miles. L onto Paper Mill Road. Proceed to camp. For Sequassen use Exit 27A. CT 8 N to Exit 46. R to CT 163. N on 163.5 miles. Turn right. See Camp Workcoeman.

Camp Wah Wah Taysee - North Haven

Connecticut Yankee (72) (see address above)

This camp is situated near the southern end of the Quinipiac Trail and Sleeping Giant State Park. FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 48. I-91 N to CT 40 to CT 10. N and R on Mt. Carmel Ave. Turn R on Ridge Rd.

Initial 213 acres were a gift from the American Legion. Terrain is very rugged with rock formations. A Trail winds its way through the forest. Peoples State Forest is located directly east. Consult *Connecticut Walk Book* for trail descriptions. FEATURES: Activity Field, hiking, X-Cntry, fishing.

Directions: I-95 N to Exit 27A. CT 8 N for 57 miles. East on US 44

High Bank (Stanley Tract) - Kent, Litchfield County

High Bank is near the Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) where it meets River Road. FEATURES: Youth group camping. Directions: I-684 N to NY 22 N to Wingdale. NY 55 E into Ct. CT 55 to US 7. Proceed N to Kent. L onto CT 341. Turn right just after bridge onto River Road. Proceed north to camp.

Housatonic Meadows State Park - Sharon, Litchfield County

Cornwall Bridge, Ct. 06754 203-927-3238 (Jan 15 to April 15) 203-672-6772 (April 15 to Labor Day)

Housatonic Meadows is located near the Appalachian Trail. The Pine Knob Trail (B) indirectly connects the AT with he park youth group camping area. Consult Section 6.3 Trails in Connecticut, Appalachian Trail Guide, Massachusetts-Connecticut, Vol. 3, and the Connecticut Walk Book. FEATURES: Fishing, boating, X-Cntry, hiking. Directions: I-684 N to NY 22 N to Wingdale. NY 55 E into Ct. CT 55 east to US 7. Turn left. North to park. Youth group area is about one mile past the main office on US 7. Camp on the left.

Kettletown State Park - Southbury, New Haven County

Southbury, Ct. 06488 203-264-5169 (Jan 15 to April 15) 203-264-5678 (April 15 to Labor Day)

Located on Lake Zoar (part of the Housatonic River). There are three trails in the park, the Pomperaug (length, 2.55 mile), the Crest (length, 1.2 miles), and the Miller (length, 1.55 miles). Pomperaug and Crest run S from the park ticket booth. Since they initially parallel and later join, it is possible to form a loop. Miller trail begins at the park ticket booth and heads north only to loop around and return to the park road. Aggregate trail mileage: 5.30. Most trails in Connecticut are blue blazed (B). Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book*. FEATURES: Fishing, hiking, youth group camping. Directions: I-84 E to Exit 14. Turn right. Proceed south on Georges Hill Road. Park on the right.

Mohawk State Forest (Ethan Allen Area) - Cornwall, Litchfield County

Located on a the blue blazed Mohawk Trail which was once the AT from Cornwall Bridge to the Lime Rock-Falls Village Area. This trail leaves the AT just N of CT 4 and connects with the uncompleted Mattatuck Trail in the state forest. For more information consult the *Connecticut Walk Book* (listed as Appalachian Trail "Eastern/Traditional Route"). FEATURES: Youth group camping, X-Cntry, hiking. Directions: I-684 N to NY 22 to Wingdale. NY 55 E into Ct. CT 55 east to US 7. Turn left. Proceed to N on 7 to Cornwall Bridge. Turn right and proceed east on CT 4.

Naugatuck State Forest (Crombie Area) - Hamden, New Haven County

FEATURES: Youth group camping. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 27A. North on CT 8 to Exit 26.

Peoples State Forest - Barkhamsted, Litchfield County

American Legion State Forest is located directly west. The Tunxis Trail runs north/south on the other side of the

Barkhamsted Reservoir, which is located to the east. Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book* section on American Legion S.F. FEATURES: X-Cntry, fishing, hiking, swimming. Directions: See American Legion State Forest.

Putnam Memorial State Park - Redding, Fairfield County

Site of the Continental Army's 1779 winter encampment under Gen. Israel Putnam. FEATURES: Activity field, fishing, hiking. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 15. US 7 N to CT 107. 107 to park.

Sleeping Giant State Park - Hamden, New Haven County (Primitive camping, NO WATER) Phone for permit, 203-789-7408

So-called since the mountain in the park resembles the form of a sleeping man. There is an extensive park trail system. Park is also located on the Quinipiac Trail, Length 21 miles. The Quinipiac Trail begins in North Haven (near Camp Wah Wah Taysee (72)) and loops around Mt. Carmel into Sleeping Giant S.P. After exiting the park, the trail travels north to terminate on CT 68 between Cheshire and Prospect. This is the oldest trail in the Conn. blue blazed system. Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book*. FEATURES: Fishing, hiking. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 48. I-91 N to Exit 10. CT 40 to CT 10. North on 10.

Cockaponset State Forest - Haddam, Middlesex County (operates May 1 to Feb 28)

Ranger Road Haddam, Ct. 06438 203-345-4449

Second largest State Forest in Connecticut. Has many miles of hiking trails. Limited backpacking possible. Cockaponset Trail (length, 7.5 miles) extends the length of the forest. The trail begins on CT 148 about 2.5 miles W of Exit 6 on CT 9. Cockaponset Trail travels north through the forest and terminates on Beaver Meadow Road .2 miles W of CT 9 Exit 8. Most trails in Connecticut are blue blazed (B). Consult the Connecticut Walk Book. FEATURES: Hiking, fishing, swimming, X-Cntry. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 69. CT 9 N to Exit 8.

Gay City State Park - Hebron, Tolland County

Park is located near the northern section of the Shenipsit Trail and adjoins Meshomasic State Forest (not described). Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book*. FEATURES: Fishing, hiking, swimming, activity field. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 48. I-91 N to I-84. Proceed east. Turn onto I-384. Exit at CT 85. Turn south.

James L. Goodwin State Forest - Hampton, Windham County

(Primitive camping, NO WATER) Phone for permit, 203-455-9534

Located on the Natchaug Trail near the trail's terminal on US 6. Backcountry campsites available on the trail in Natchaug State Forest. Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book*.

FEATURES: Fishing, hiking, boating, X-Cntry. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 76. I-395 N to Exit 91. US 6 west to Hampton (about 12 miles).

Hurd State Park - East Hampton, Middlesex County

This state park also has FEATURES for canoe camping as it is located on the Connecticut River. FEATURES: Fishing, hiking, boating, X-Cntry, activity field, canoe camping. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 48. I-91 N to Exit 16. CT 66 east to Cobalt. Turn right. Proceed south on CT 151.

Mansfield Hollow State Park (Old Windham Road Area) - Mansfield, Tolland County (Open Jan 1 to Feb 28, April 15 to October)

One of the southern terminals of the Nipmuck Trail is located in the picnic grove of this park (the Nipmuck Trail has two southern terminals). Backcountry campsites available on the trail in Nipmuck State Forest. Consult *Connecticut Walk Book*. See map in Section 6.3. FEATURES: Fishing, hiking, boating, X-Cntry, activity field. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 76. I-395 N to Exit 81. CT 2 west to CT 32. 32 north to Willimantic. Take CT 195 N out of Willimantic. Turn right onto Bassets Bridge Road. Proceed 0.9 miles.

Cashamoquet Brook State Park (Indian Chair Area) - Pomfret, Windham County

Pomfret Center, Ct. 06259, 203-928-6121

Two campgrounds other than the group camping area are available, these are Mashamoquet Brook and Wolf Den. Park was formed by combining three state parks. Extensive Trail system can be used for backpacking (no backcountry sites). FEATURES: Fishing, hiking, swimming, activity field. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 76. I-395 N to Exit 93. CT 101 west to park.

Nye Holman State Forest (Archery Range Area) - Tolland, Tolland County (open April 15 to Feb 28)

FEATURES: Youth group camping. Directions: I-84 east to Exit 69.

Pachaug State Forest (C.C.C. Area) - Voluntown, New London County

RFD 1, Voluntown, Ct. 06384 203-376-4075

Narragansett Trail System extending into R.I. and connecting with Yawgoog Scout Camp (546). Trails include the Nehantic,

Pachaug, and the Pequot. See map. Extensive forest trail system also. Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book* and the AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide. See Chapter 7, Section 7.3, which deals with the Pequot-Narragansett Trail. FEATURES: Activity field, swimming, fishing, X-Cntry, hiking, backcountry camping. Directions: I-95 N to Exit 76. I-395 N to Exit 85. CT 164 N to CT 138. CT 138 east 10 miles. See map.

Shenipsit State Forest (County Road Area) - West Stafford, Tolland County

(open July 15 to Feb 28 and first part of May)

Located on the northern section of the uncompleted Shenipsit Trail. Consult the *Connecticut Walk Book*. FEATURES: Youth group camping. Directions: I-95 north to Exit 28. I-91 north to Exit 47. CT 190 east.

SECTION 6.3 TRAILS IN CONNECTICUT

(Most trails in Ct. are blue blazed with the exception of the AT. There are other exceptions.)

Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) Blazes: white (W), length 49 miles in Connecticut.

The Appalachian Trail enters Connecticut not far from Gaylordsville in northern Fairfield County. Camp Siwanoy (388) in New York is nearby. The trail proceed north through Litchfield County keeping to ridges and river valleys. Most roadwalking has been eliminated but some remains. The traditional route of the AT in CT has been relocated. The trail used to swing east along what is now the Mohawk Trail through Mohawk State Forest. Note: Camping in Connecticut is very strictly regulated. Camp only in designated areas while hiking the AT. Consult Appalachian Trail Guide for Connecticut and Massachussetts and the Connecticut Walk Book

OTHER TRAILS IN CONNECTICUT

All trails in Connecticut are blue blazed (B) with the exception of the Appalachian Trail (AT) which is white (W). For more complete descriptions consult the *Connecticut Walk Book*. In western Connecticut the New York Walk Book is also useful. Camping is prohibited except in designated areas.

Pine Knob Loop Trail Length 2.5 miles (other red blazed side trails in the area)

Pine Knob Loop begins on US 7 (parking available) 1.1 miles north of Cornwall Bridge. It provides a link with the youth group camping area of Housatonic S.P. and the AT. The trail ascends to the point where the loop begins 0.2 miles from US 7. Turning right the trail begins to climbs Pine Knob. At 0.4 miles a side trail diverges right and leads to the main camping area on US 7. 75 yards farther on another trail leads right to the group camping area. The trail reaches the summit of Pine Knob about one mile from US 7 after passing some spectacular cliffs (good views). Crossing Pine Knob the AT is reached at 1.2 miles from US 7. Pine Knob Trail merges with AT for a short distance. (R is north, L is south on AT). Pine Knob then diverges L and descends to main trail. Total distance is 1.8 miles. US 7 is 0.2 miles down main trail.

Mattatuck Trail - Length 35 miles.

Trail begins in Mohawk State Forest on a blue blazed Mohawk Trail, which was formerly the AT. (This trail meets the current AT near Cornwall Bridge and CT 4). There is a gap on the Mattatuck Trail between Milton and Litchfield. By walking on Flat Rocks Road, College St, Seeley Road, E. Cornwall Road, and Maple Street the gap can be bridged. The trail resumes on Maple Street just north of Bantam on US 202. Continuing southeast the trail crosses White Woods Road (R to East Shore Street leads to Bantam Lake AYH Hostel - See Appendix A). It then passes Pitch, Morris, and Wigwam

Reservoirs before arriving at Black Rock State Park. There is a network of trails in this area. Crossing CT 8, Mattatuck Trail head east passing Camp Mattatuck (66) at Mt. Tobe Road. The trail then turns south at Buttermilk Falls and terminates on CT 69 at Mad River Road about five miles northeast of Waterbury. (CT 69 is Exit 23 off I-84 eastbound). Consult the Connecticut Walk Book for more detailed information.

Metacomet Trail Length 45 miles in Connecticut (Metacomet-Monadnock Trail in Mass.)

Metacomet Trail begins on CT 15 (Berlin Turnpike) about one mile south of Berlin. The trail heads north keeping (as in Massachusetts) to the crest of the western ridge of the Connecticut River Valley. The trail passes New Britain, I-84, Farmington, Simsbury, and exits the state via Warnertown Road near Rising Corners, Ma. Since camping FEATURES are nonexistent, the trail will not be described in great detail. Metacomet-Monaknock crosses Mass, and enters N.H. and terminates on Mt. Monadnock. See Chapter 9 Section 9.3 and Chapter 10 Section 10.2.3.

NIPMUCK AND NATCHAUG TRAIL SYSTEM

Nipmuck Trail Length 29.3 to CT 171

The Nipmuck Trail has two southern terminals. The eastern in Mansfield Hollow State Park in the picnic grove off Bassets Bridge Road. The western about two miles away on Puddin' Lane. The two trails converge at Spring Hill and run north past Gurleyville and cross US 44 just east of Mansfield. Continuing north, Nipmuck enters Natchaug State Forest. The Natchaug Trail diverges right in the Westford area. There are two backcountry campsites. One near CT 74 and the other near Westford and the Natchaug Trail junction. Nipmuck continues north although on somewhat a sinuous course. It crosses CT 171 just east of Union and enters Nipmuck State Forest (mileage shown above figured only to this point). There is an extensive network of trails in Nipmuck S.F. and neighboring Bigelow Hollow State Park. The trail here is in the vicinity of Camp Pomperaug (68). Nipmuck terminates near Breakneck Road on the Mass/Ct State Line.

See map and consult the Connecticut Walk Book.

Natchaug Trail Length, 12 miles (southern section), 4 miles (northern section).

Natchaug begins in the conservation area of James L. Goodwin State Forest. The trail travels north through Natchaug State Forest and emerges on US 44 in the vicinity of J.N. Webster S.R. (66). There is a closed section of the trail from here to the Eastford area. The trail resumes on Ashford Road one mile south of Camp Nahaco (66). Continuing north, Natchaug Trail terminates on Nipmuck Trail near the Eastford-Westford Road in the vicinity of Westford. One Backcountry campsite located on the trail. See map and consult the Connecticut Walk Book.

NARRAGANSETT TRAIL SYSTEM

This system includes several trails in and around Patchaug State Forest in eastern Conn. The Narragansett Trail itself extends into R.I. and connects with Yawgoog S.R. (546) trails and Arcadia Management Area. (See Chapter 7, Sections 7.1, 7.2, and 7.3). There are also backcountry campsites in the system. See map and consult the Connecticut Walk Book.

Pequot and Narragansett Trails Length, Narragansett; 20 miles (16 in Ct. ant 4 in R.I.), Pequot; 10 miles

Pequot Trail is shown vaguely on the map since there is no backcountry camping. It begins about one mile east of Norwich and heads south and then east to join the Narragansett Trail in the Lantern Hill area. Narragansett Trail begins at CT 2 and Wintechog Hill Road. It climbs Lantern Hill and meets the Pequot Trail, which diverges R. Block Island is visible form this hill. Narragansett heads east and crosses CT 2 at the junction of CT 201. There is a backcountry campsite on the trail after crossing 201. Heading NE, the trail passes Wyassup Lake, crosses CT 49 and enters Pachaug State Forest. Narragansett Trail angels toward the north and meets the Nehantic and Pachaug Trails in the Green Fall Pond Area. There is another backcountry campsite in this area. Turning east the trail enters Rhode Island. See Chapter 7. Section 7.3.

See map and consult the Connecticut Walk Book.

Nehantic Trail Length, 14 miles.

Nehantic begins with the Pachaug Trail at Green Fall Pond on the Narragansett Trail in Pachaug S.F. Nehantic heads NW while Pachaug heads N. (There are several crossover trails between the two). Nehantic crosses CT 165 and Ct 49 near Voluntown. It passes the Forest Ranger Headquarters and meets the Pachaug Trail at Mt. Misery. There is a campsite at this location. Both trails head west for a short distance and then divide with the Nehantic turning right and north. The trails heads north to the junction with the Castle Trail (not described or shown on map). Castle Trail links up with the Pachaug Trail to the east. Turning west Nehantic enters Hopeville S.P. and terminates on Park Road just east of Jewett City (I-395 Exit 86). See map and consult the Connecticut Walk Book.

Pachaug Trail Length, 30 miles

The Pachaug Trail is entirely within state land. It begins with the Nehantic Trail at Green Fall Pond on the Narragansett Trail. It heads north, however and loops east into Rhode Island connecting with the Tippecansett Trail (not described). Pachaug continues north passing a backcountry campsite. It then loops around to the south. A spur trail leads north to CT 14A between Sterling Hill and Plainfield (I-395 Exit 88). Heading south Pachaug passes the Castle Trail (not described) which leads west to the Nehantic Trail and Hopeville S.P. Pachaug Trail meets the Nehantic Trail in the Mt. Misery area (campsite here). The two trails merge for a short distance. The trails divide with the Pachuag turning left and heading west crossing CT 138 once and passing the northern end of Pachaug Pond. The trail terminates on CT 138 just east of Pachaug, Ct. See map and consult the Connecticut Walk Book.

Shenipsit Trail Length, 30 miles (when completed)

Southern section begins at CT 66 and CT 151 in Cobalt. The trail travels north crossing Meshomasic S.F. and crossing CT 2 near Marlborough. Shenipsit continues north passing Gay City S.P. Gay City's trails link up with Shenipsit. The southern section terminates in the Bolton area at Finley Street and Camp Meeting Road (I-384 overpass). Northern section is not described here. For more information consult Connecticut Walk Book.

Tunxis Trail Length 31 miles (northern section Pell Rd south to Hotchkiss Rd).

Tunxis Trail begins in the north on Pell Road in Tunxis State Forest. There are three FEATURES for backpackers only on the northern half. There is a two mile gap near Burlington and another 7 mile gap near Bristol. Only the northern half will be described. Trail runs south on the eastern side of Barkhamsted Reservoir (but not on the actual shore). The trail crosses CT 219, US 44 and US 202. The northern half terminates on Hotchkiss Road just north of Burlington and CT 4. See map.

Under Mountain and Paradise Lane Trails

Under Mountain length 1.9 miles, Paradise Lane length 2.1 miles

Under Mountain Trail begins on CT 41 (parking available) 3.4 miles north of Salisbury, Ct. It provides an access to Bear Mountain, the AT at mile 47.8, and Sages Ravine Campsite. At 1.1 miles from CT 41 the Paradise Lane Trail diverges right, by-passing Bear Mt. and meeting the AT in Mass 0.6 miles south of Sages Ravine. The Under Mountain Trail continues west and meets the AT at Riga Junction. These two trails make a good one day or overnight trip to this area as they provide easy access to Bear Mt. and Sages Ravine (backcountry camping available here).

Directions: I-684 N to US 22. 22 north to US 44. 44 east to Salisbury, Ct. Left onto CT 41. Proceed north for 3.4 miles, trailhead on left.

Mohawk Trail Length 25.5 miles. (Formerly the AT through Mohawk S.F.)

The Mohawk Trail leaves R from the Appalachian Trail at northbound mile 22.1. The trail descends to the junction of CT 4 and US 7 (parking available here). The trail loops around through Mohawk State Forest and rejoins the AT just south of Falls Village at mile 34.4. 7.7 miles from the southern end, the Mattatuck Trail diverges R. There were many lean-tos and campsites on this trail when it was the AT. It is unknown at this time whether these camping areas will be allowed to remain. For a more complete description, consult the Connecticut Walk Book or an older edition of the Appalachian Trail Guide to Massachusetts-Connecticut, Volume #3 (prior to the Seventh Edition). In the Walk Book the Mohawk Trail is listed as the Appalachian Trail "Eastern" (Traditional) Route.



Located near George Washington and Buck Hill Management Areas. Both areas have extensive trail systems. FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos, boating. DIRECTIONS: I-95 N to I-395, North to Exit 97, US 44 E to RI 100, turn N.

Champlin Scout Reservation - Cranston FEATURES: Tent sites, cabins, Cub Scout summer program. DIRECTIONS: I-95 N into RI to I-295, exit at Cranston.

SECTION 7.3 TRAILS AND FURTHER READING

Pequot Narragansett Trail (Narragansett Trail in RI)

Enters RI just north of Yawgoog Road. The trail travels with Yawgoog Road for a short distance and leaves to the right in the vicinity of Yawgoog Pond. Following the west shore of the pond, Narragansett Trail intersects with the trails of Yawgoog Scout Reservation (546). The trail then heads south, crosses the Rockville-Hopkington Road and climbs some rocky ledges near Ell and Long Pond. Heading southeast the trail terminates near Canonchet on Canonchet Road. This is near Exit 3 on I-95. Since the trail extends into Connecticut and passes in the vicinity of a scout camp, backpacking trips can be planned using the route. See trails in Connecticut Chapter 6, Section 6.3.

Camp Lavigne - Benton

Located north of Benton, this camp lies near Ricketts Glen S.P.,which has FEATURES for backpacking. Using the two areas it is possible to plan backpacking treks. FEATURES (year round), Cabins, tent sites, lean-tos, fishing, hiking, trail system, summer program. DIRECTIONS: I-80 W across N.J. into Pa. West on 80 to Exit 35. North on Pa. 487.

SECTION 8.3 NATIONAL AREAS

Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area - Monroe and Pike Counties (also in New Jersey)

National Park Service Office Eastern National Park and Management Assn. Delaware Water Gap NRA Bushkill, PA 18324

Originally indented to be part of the Tocks Island Dam Project (it is unlikely that the dam will ever be built), this area occupies the 35 mile stretch of the Delaware River in PA and NJ from Port Jervis, NY to Stroudsburg, PA. Hiking opportunities are numerous. The area is also ideal for canoeing as it straddles the Delaware River. Camping is only permitted in designated areas near the river. Detailed Maps are available from the National Park Service Office.

Backcountry camping on Appalachian Trail (AT) (W), see Appalachian Trail in New Jersey (Chapter 5, Section 5.4). Canoe camping on Delaware River. DIRECTIONS: I-80 W into New Jersey. For Dingman's Ferry Exit 34B and take NJ 15 and US 206 north. Turn left at Co Rd 560. This will lead to Dingman's Ferry. For Hidden Lake Campsite, proceed W on I-80 into Pa. Take Exit 52. Proceed north on US 209 to Bushkill. Turn onto Hidden Lake Drive and proceed 2 miles. For River's Bend I-80 west in NJ to Exit 1. Proceed along the river for 14 miles.



Allegheny National Forest

Allegheny National Forest HQ Box 837 Warren, PA 16365

Located in northwestern PA, the forest consists of 500,000 acres of land. There are many hiking trails throughout the forest. These include The North Country Trail, which will, when completed, stretch from Vermont to North Dakota. Open camping is permitted in most areas of the forest (there are exceptions).

Note: Allegheny is NOT a national park, rather it is a national forest. As such, it is utilized for many different purposes, as distinct from a park, which is primarily used for recreation. Formal FEATURES may be limited. Plan and check accordingly before spending any time in the forest.

DIRECTIONS: I-80 W from GW Bridge across NJ. I-80 W in PA to Exits 16 and 13, then north. Exact instructions are not possible due to the size of the Forest.

SECTION 8.4 TRAILS IN PENNSYLVANIA

Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) Blazes: White (W), length 229.7 miles in Pa.

Appalachian Trail enters PA at the Delaware Water Gap via the I-80 Bridge (no parking or stopping on the bridge). Use Dunfield Parking Area in NJ on I-80. See Chapter 5, Section 5.4 Trails in New Jersey. In PA take the first exit off I-80 marked Delaware Water Gap. Proceed south on PA 611 to Delaware Avenue at the intersection of Main Street and Mountain Road. After leaving the Gap, the AT climbs Mt Minsi and proceeds in a generally southwesterly direction keeping to the ridges and only losing height to traverse the many gaps of northwestern Pa. The AT crosses the Susquehanna River at Clarks Ferry (US 22 - Exit 23 on I-81 southbound). The Trail then passes through Duncannon, famous for being the midpoint of the AT. Veering off more to the south the AT crosses Blue Mt and then enters the Cumberland Valley. The AT leaves PA at Penn Mar, PA (Exit 3 off I-81, PA 16 E to Rouzerville, R to Pen Mar). State Parks on the trail are Pine Grove Furnace in Cumberland County and Caledonia State Park straddling Adams and Franklin Counties. Boy Scout Camps located near the AT are Bashore Scout Res. (524) at Licksdale and Camp Tuckahoe (544) near Dillsburg.

Note: water may be difficult to obtain on the northern sections of the trail after mid summer. For more information on the AT in Pa consult, *Appalachian Trail Guide to Pennsylvania*, Vol. #5, , 1985, Keystone Trails Association, Lib. of Cong. Cat. No: 85-050572 – newer editions available.

Loyalsock Trail (LT) (R) Blazes: Red (R), Length: 60 miles.

The Loyalsock Trail runs northeast from a point on PA 87 ten miles north of Montoursville. It parallels the Loyalsock Creek for most of its length. LT is a ridge trail and traverses state forest lands. Formal FEATURES may be obtained at World's End State Park near the eastern terminus. Camp Brule', B.S.A. (375) is located in the Forksville area near World's End S.P. The trail terminates on US 220 at Ringdale. Maps and guides available from Williamsport Alpine Club, P.O. Box 501, Williamsport, Pa. 17701.

Mason-Dixon Trail (B & W) Blazes: Blue and White (B & W), Length: 204 miles.

The Mason-Dixon Trail forms a large loop in eastern Pa, northern Delaware, and Maryland. It begins on the Horse Shoe Trail (B) just north of Ludwigs Corner, Pa. Travelling south via the Brandywine trail, the blazes here are white. Passing Marsh Creek State Park, the trail passes near the AYH Hostel of the same name. At Chadds Ford the blue blazes begin. Mason-Dixon crosses into Delaware and turning west enters Maryland passing Elk Neck State Park and Rodney Scout Reservation (81). Crossing the Susquehanna River the trail arrives at Harve de Grace where it turns north and follows the west bank of the river. This is one of the few hilly sections of the trail. Continuing north, Mason-Dixon passes Susquehanna S.P. and passes through Broad Creek Scout Reservation (220). Re-entering Pennsylvania the trail keeps to the river as far as Wrightsville. Here it veers off to the northwest. Travelling northwest, Mason-Dixon passes through Gifford Pinchot State Park and terminates on the Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) near the village of Dillsburg. Camp Tuckahoe (544) is nearby. Note: Trail is mostly level except when near the AT and Susquehanna River. Great deal of road walking.

Horse Shoe Trail (Y) Blazes: Yellow, Length 130 miles.

Begins on the Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) just N of PA 325. It travels southeast to Valley Forge. French Creek S.P. is located on the trail east of Geigertown. American Youth Hostels (AYH) has a facility on the trail at Bowmansville (there are other AYH FEATURES but these are not set up for groups). The trail is also used by horses. Maps and guides available from: Horse Shoe Trail Club, Margeret Chalfant, 509 Cheltena Ave, Jenkintown, Pa 19046. DIRECTIONS: NJ Turnpike to Exit 6. PA Turnpike W. Exits 24 through 19.

Beartown State Forest - Monterey, Berkshire County Blue Hill Road, Monterey, 413-528-0904

Beartown is an undeveloped State Forest the second largest in Massachusetts. There is an extensive trail system, in addition to being located on the Appalachian Trail (AT) (W). One of the features of the park is Laura Tower, which provides views of the surrounding countryside. Additional trail literature, available from the Laura Hill Association can be found in the Stockbridge Library. Information also available from the AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide. FEATURES: Group camping, hiking, X-Cntry, swimming, fishing, boating. DIRECTIONS: NY 22 N to Hillsdale (60 miles from the end of I-684). Turn right onto NY 23. Proceed east into Mass. Continue on MA 23 past Great Barrington. Turn left onto Brett Road about one mile past MA 57 Jct.

Clarksburg State Forest - Berkshire County - 413-663-6312

Appalachian Trail in Clarksburg S.F. The AT is not near the formal campsites. FEATURES: Camping, hiking, X-Cntry, swimming, fishing, boating, bicycling. DIRECTIONS: NY 22 N to Stephentown (about 90 miles north of the end of I-684). Turn right onto NY 43 and proceed east into Mass. Continue on MA 43 to MA 2. Proceed to North Adams. October Mtn State Forest - Lee, Berkshire County - 413-243-1778

October Mountain is the largest state forest in Mass. There are many miles of hiking trails. The Appalachian Trail crosses the park but does not visit the formal camping FEATURES. For more information on trails, consult the *AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide*. Map available from the Mass DEM. FEATURES: Camping, hiking, X-Cntry, swimming, fishing, boating, showers. DIRECTIONS: I-95 N into Connecticut to Exit 27A. Proceed N on CT 8 into Massachusetts. Continue on MA 8 to US 20. Turn left and proceed west on 20 to Lee. Turn right onto Center Street and follow signs for Forest (about 2 miles).

Mt. Greylock State Reservation - Lanesborough, Berkshire County - 413-499-4262

Mt. Greylock is the highest point in Massachusetts. The summit is accessible by three roads and many trails. The Appalachian Trail passes over the summit. The reservation, which surrounds the mountain also, offers much in the way of hiking. Maps available from the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC) and the Mass DEM. For more information on trails consult the AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide. Special restrictions govern the Reservation. Check

carefully and plan accordingly. FEATURES: Camping, hiking, X-Cntry, fishing. DIRECTIONS: Reservation accessible from US 7, MA 2, and MA 8. NY 22 N to Stephentown (90 miles N of end of I-684). Turn right onto NY 43. Proceed into Mass. Turn right at Jiminy Peak. Proceed to US 7. For MA 2 and 8, stay on MA 43 to MA 2. Turn right. MA 8 meets 2 in North Adams. Turn south.

Mt. Washington State Forest - Berkshire County - 413-528-0330

Known as the most remote state facility in Massachusetts, Mt. Washington occupies the extreme southwestern corner of the state. The South Taconic Trail passes through the Forest. See Taconic State Park in New York. Many other miles of trails exist. For more information on trails consult the AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide and the New York Walk Book. FEATURES: Backcountry camping, hiking, X-Cntry, boating, fishing. DIRECTIONS: NY 22 N to NY 343. Turn right. Proceed into Mass. Forest office located on East Street.

Pittsfield State Forest - Berkshire County - 413-442-8992

This Forest has within its boundaries Berry Pond that is the highest pond in Mass. There are many trails in the Forest. Consult *AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide*. Maps available from the AMC and Mass DEM. Taconic Skyline Trail (W) (length, 21 miles) passes for about half of it's length through the Forest. Taconic Skyline is a ridge trail blazed in the 1930's by the C.C.C. It begins on MA 41 just opposite the Richmond cemetery and ends on US 7 1/2 mile N of Brodie Mtn. Road. FEATURES: Group camping, camping, fishing, X-Cntry, hiking, boating, swimming. DIRECTIONS: NY 22 N to New Lebanon (about 83 miles N of end of I-684). Turn right onto US 20. Proceed into Massachusetts to Pittsfield. Turn left onto US 7 and then left again onto West Street. Turn right on Churchill Street and left again onto Cascade Street 1.6 miles later. Follow signs.

FEATURES: Camping, boating, fishing, hiking, X-Cntry, showers, swimming. DIRECTIONS: I-91 N to Exit 27. E on MA 2 to MA 2A. Follow MA 2A to Dice Road.

Granville State Forest - Hampden County - 413-357-6611

Granville S.F. has been compared to a wild garden. Once a pioneer settlement and later an agricultural community, the remains of many buildings are found around the park. Old chimneys are used in many areas as picnic fireplaces. The Forest has an extensive trail system and adjoins Tunxis State Forest in Connecticut. Maps available from the Mass DEM. Consult *AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide*. FEATURES: Camping, fishing, hiking, X-Cntry, swimming. DIRECTIONS: I-95 N in Ct. to Exit 27A. CT 8 N into Mass. Turn right onto MA 57. Proceed 2.5 miles past Tolland. Turn right.

Kenneth M. Dubuque Memorial State Forest - Franklin County – 413-339-6631

Extensive trail system with four lean-tos scattered about the Forest. These lean-tos are the only formal camping FEATURES, which exist in K. M. Dubuque. Terrain in the Forest is very rugged. Forest adjoins Savoy Mountain and Mohawk Trail State Forests. Maps available from the Mass DEM. Consult AMC Massachusetts and Rhode Island Trail Guide. Plan well in advance before using this Forest. FEATURES: Backcountry camping, boating, fishing, and hiking, X-Entry. DIRECTIONS: 1-91 N to Exit 19. MA 9 W to MA 112. Turn right. Proceed north to MA 116. Turn west. Turn right onto MA 8A.

Mohawk Trail Sate Forest - Charlemont, Franklin County - 413-339-5504

Mohawk Trail S.F. lies in some very mountainous country. The 4 1/2 mile long Hoosac Tunnel is nearby. Extensive trail system. Forest adjoins Savoy Mountain and Dubuque State Forests. Warning: The Hoosac Tunnel is an active railroad tunnel. STAY AWAY FROM IT. FEATURES: Group camping,

camping, fishing, hiking, X-Cntry, swimming, showers. DIRECTIONS: I-91 N to Exit 26. MA 2 west for 22 miles.

Tolland State Forest - Otis, Hampden County - 413-269-7268

Metacomet-Monadnock Trail (W) and Robert Frost Trail (O)

Metacomet-Monadnock blazes: white (W), length 102 miles in Mass.

Robert Frost blazes: orange (O), length 33 miles.

This trail is the continuation of the Metacomet Trail in Connecticut (See Trails in Connecticut). It enters Mass near the town line of Southwick and Agawam. Travelling north along the western ridge of the Connecticut River Valley, the trail crosses Provin and East Mountains and Mt. Tom while en route. At mile 27.6 it arrives at the Connecticut River. There is a heavily used boat ramp here but no public ferry service. After crossing the river the trail heads east across J. A. Skinner S. P. (not described). Leaving Skinner, Metacomet-Monadnock meets the Robert Frost Trail (O), which diverges, left. Metacomet-Monadnock continues east and turns north near the Quabbin Reservoir. Continuing north between the Amherst Area and the Quabbin the trail again meets the Robert Frost Trail (O) which enters form left. The Robert Frost Trail (O) coincides with the Mettacomet-Monadnock for a short distance. Robert Frost (O) then leaves L and travels northwest and terminates at Mt. Toby Demonstration Forest (not described). Metacomet-Monadnock continues north and enters Erving State Forest just above MA 2. The trail then turns northeast and enters New Hampshire just east of MA/NH 32 at Falls Brook. The trail continues north in NH and terminates at the summit of Mt. Monadnock. Chapter 10 - NORTHERN NEW ENGLAND

(Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont)

Northern New England (Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont) is the area in the most northeasterly part of the continental United States. Its outdoor FEATURES and potential experiences are both extensive and excellent. The area is home to two National Forests both with extensive trail systems, a National Park, and numerous state park and forest FEATURES. Trails are described in some very excellent publications dealing with the area. See Section 10.1.6, Section 10.2.4, and Section 10.3.3.

Major roads to Northern New England. NY 22 and US 7 serve western Vermont. I-95 N to Exit 21 in New York. I-287 W to I-684. 684 N to 22. US 7 parallels 22 for most of its length. 7 is Exit 15 on I-95 in Connecticut. Western Vermont may also be accessed by Interstate 87 (I-87 begins at the Bronx side of the Triboro Bridge).

Interstate 91 runs north along the Connecticut River from New Haven, CT to Derby Line, VT at the Canadian border. I-95 N into CT. I-91 is Exit 48.

Interstate 93 serves central New Hampshire. I-91 N to Hartford. I-84 east to the Mass Pike. East to Exit 11A. I-495 north to US 3 or I-93.

Interstate 95 serves Maine. It runs north from Kittery in the south to Houlton in the north near the New Brunswick/Maine (Canadian) border.

SECTION 10.1.3 GREEN MOUNTAIN NATIONAL FOREST (GMNF)

The Green Mountain National Forest (GMNF) is made up of 250,000 acres of land in central Vermont stretching south to north for over 100 miles. There are two main sections, the southern, stretching from VT 9 to the Wallingford area, and the northern stretching from Sherburne to Bristol. Sadly, unlike the White Mountain National Forest in New Hampshire, the Forest has actually acquired only about 40% of the acreage within the purchase boundary.

Camping in the GMNF is permitted wherever not prohibited. but certain areas are restricted due to overuse. Check carefully and plan accordingly. For trail description consult Guide to the Long Path, Day Hiker's Guide to Vermont, and the Appalachian Trail Guide to New Hampshire and Vermont, Volume #2. See Section 10.1.6

SECTION 10.1.4 TRAILS IN VERMONT

Appalachian Trail (AT) and Long Trail (LT) Blazes, white (W). LT length, 265 miles AT length in VT, 137 miles.

The LT is the oldest long distance hiking trail in the nation. James P. Taylor first conceived the idea for a trail in 1909. The Green Mountain Club (GMC) was formed the next year to facilitate construction. Work was accomplished in sections over the next twenty years. The trail was completed in 1930 when the last remaining section was extended to the Canadian border. The LT was the inspiration for the more famous AT and the still uncompleted Long Path (LP) of New York

The AT and the LT continue north through the Green Mountain National Forest along Vermont's central ridge. The trail passes many well-known mountains such as Stratton and Killington to name only two. At Sherburne Pass on US 4 (10 miles east of Rutland) the trails divide (this point is 97 miles from the Ma/Vt line). LT continues north staying within the remainder of the Green Mountain National Forest. It crosses Mt. Mansfield and the Camel's Hump (among many others) and terminates at the Canadian Border. The AT turns east towards New Hampshire which it enters at Hanover (I-91 Exit 13) 40 miles from separation with LT. The National Forest was established by the Weeks Act and comprises over 750,000 acres (47,000 in Maine). It lies in the north-central area of New Hampshire and stretches from Maine almost to the Connecticut River in the west. Outdoor opportunities in the WMNF are extensive. The forest has an extensive trail system maintained by the Forest Service and the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC). The AMC also maintains and operates eight huts on the Appalachian Trail all within a days walk of each other. (Huts are small food service and lodging FEATURES in remote areas of the Forest). Camping in the forest is permitted wherever not prohibited. In recent years however, there has been a need to establish Restricted Use Areas (RUA's) since some sites have been overused. Maps of the RUA's are available from the Forest supervisor in Laconia.

The Presidential Range and the famous Mt. Washington (elevation 6288 feet) lie within the Forest. Mt. Washington is the highest point in the Northeast. This is an area where the mountains tower over the valleys and whose summits are well above the tree (timber) line. The slopes are steep with deep ravines cut into their sides.

It is important to remember that White Mountain National Forest is like Allegheny in Pennsylvania and Green Mountain in Vermont a National Forest and not a National Park. As such it has a variety of uses and this includes, but is not

limited to, timber production. Recreational value and preservation of scenic beauty is however, a high priority with forest management.

APPALACHIAN TRAIL (AT) (W) IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

The AT traverses the WMNF in a southwest to northeasterly direction. It enters New Hampshire at Hanover and turning north enters the Forest near Glencliff. AT then crosses Mt. Moosilauke before arriving at Franconia Notch. From here to the northern terminus on Mt. Katahdin in Me. (more than 350 miles distant) is considered to be the most difficult and most remote section of the entire AT. The trail then traverses the northern Pemigewasset Wilderness and crossing US 302 just south of Crawford Notch it begins to ascend the Presidential Range. The AT crosses this area visiting the summit of Mt. Washington (no lodging or camping). AT then traverses the remainder of the Presidential Range and continuing northeast exits New Hampshire just before Mahoosic Notch (MOST difficult section on the entire length of the AT). WARNING: The area of the Presidential Range in particular around and on Mt. Washington is subject to some of the most violent weather in North America. It is not at all uncommon to encounter snow and other types of wintry storms in the summer months. The writer has personally witnessed an ice storm in progress in August. The highest wind velocity ever recorded by a ground station (231 M.P.H.) was timed on April 12, 1934. **DO NOT** under any circumstances venture into the area under deteriorating or bad weather conditions. Several lives have been lost because of failure to heed warnings. If weather should suddenly turn bad while en route (which it can without warning) turn back or seek shelter immediately. In the absence of any clear trail the only safe course is down. Even this may be difficult or impossible. This warning applies to all high peaks in Northern New England which include Mt. Mansfield in Vt., Mt. Katahdin in Me., and several other peaks in NH. <The above was paraphrased from the AMC White Mountain Guide, page 8-11, 24 edition, 1987 Appalachian Mountain Club, Boston, Mass.>

Baxter State Park (BSP) - Piscataquis County (Percival P. Baxter State Park)

This park, a huge rectangle in northern Maine was a gift from former Governor Percival P. Baxter to the state of Maine under the proviso that it be "forever kept" in it's natural state. Some of the features of BSP include Mt. Katahdin (elevation 5267 ft), highest point in Maine, the northern terminus of the Appalachian Trail, and a jumping off point at Telos Lake for the Allagash Wilderness Waterway. There are many miles of trails and backcountry campsites (reservations needed). BSP is a very remote and primitive park. FEATURES are limited. Plan your trip well in advance no later than January of the year in which you wish to use BSP. For trail descriptions consult AMC Maine Mountain Guide. See Section 10.3.3 below.

WARNING: This area like the Presidential Range in New Hampshire is subject to some of the most violent weather in North America. Since however, access routes are considerably longer in Baxter than in the White Mountains the danger is increased considerably. That storms can "come up" rapidly and without warning in this area is matter of personal experience to the writer. NEVER under any circumstance venture onto the high peaks under deteriorating weather conditions, even if this means schedule/reservation disruption and missed connections. Plan accordingly.

FEATURES: Tent sites, lean-tos, hiking. DIRECTIONS: I-95 N into Maine. Continue to Exit 56. West on ME 157 to Millinocket. Continue straight following signs for the park. Park office is on the left as you enter Millinocket.

Acadia National Park - Hancock County

Acadia is the first National Park to be established east of the Mississippi River. The park occupies a heart shaped island known as Mt. Desert Island. Although the mountains here are not high they command sweeping vistas as they rise out of the sea. The island is very mountainous and Sommes Sound, a body of water between the east and west sections is said to be the only true fiord on the East Coast. Since the elevations of the mountains in Acadia are not of any great height, bad weather in the high country will merely mean an uncomfortable situation rather than a life threatening one.

Black Woods, Seawall, and Isle au Haut Campgrounds:

There are two campgrounds operated by Acadia N.P., Black Woods and Seawall. Black Woods operates all year; reservations must be made through Destinet Co. from June 15 to September 20. First come first served for the rest of the year. Seawall operates seasonally and is available on a first come first served basis. Seawall has excellent group camping FEATURES. Isle au Haut reservations must be made with park HQ after April 1 (not before).

Appalachian Trail (AT) (W) Blazes: white (W), length 277 miles in Maine.

The Appalachian Trail runs in a northeasterly direction from Mahoosuc Notch to Baxter State Park. The AT climbs Mt. Katahdin and terminates at the summit of Baxter Peak. Hikers are required to check in at Daicey Pond Campground before entering the park. Total AT mileage in Maine is 277 miles. Mahoosuc Notch is considered to be the roughest section on the entire length of the AT. It should be noted that this is the most remote section of the entire AT. There is one major river ford (Kennebec River). If trouble should be encountered, help may not be readily available. Plan accordingly.



SECTION 10.3.4 ALLAGASH WILDERNESS WATERWAY

From Telos Lake in northern Baxter State Park, this waterway travels via the Allagash River and several lakes for ninety-eight miles northward to Allagash Village on the Canadian border. This is the ultimate in wilderness camping and canoeing and there are many fine wilderness campsites on the route. As the name implies, a trip on the Allagash is truly a wilderness experience. Guides and advance reservations are necessary.

Note: The Allagash River is NOT for the novice outdoorsman or canoeist. A group should be well experienced before attempting the Allagash.

The island in Maryland is managed by the US Fish and Wildlife Service and is referred to as Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge. The opportunities for observing nature on the island are limitless.
