## STODDARD HAMMOND DIES AT HIS SULLIVAN COUNTY HOME

### For Twenty-five Years He Was Prominently Identified with the Business Activities of Binghamton

Stoddard Hammond, a well known Binghamtonian, died late Saturday evening at his home in Willowemoc, Sullivan county.

Mr. Hammond was 75 years of age. He was born in Grahamsville, Sullivan county and in his early business life he was associated with his father, who was a prominent farmer in Grahamsville. Mr. Hammond moved to this city about 25 years ago and resided here until about two years ago. While in this city he was actively interested in a number of manufacturing and other business enterprises, but devoted most of his time to acid factories of which he owned a number throughout the Southern Tier.

In 1887, Stoddard Hammond with several other prominent men of Binghamton, incorporated the City Hospital and Mr. Hammond was elected treasurer of the institution, filling that office with honor for four years.

Two years ago Mr. Hammond moved to Willowemoc to take charge of one of his large acid factories located there.

Mr. Hammond is survived by his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Mason and Mrs. Benjamin King of Boston, and Miss Mary Hammond, who resided with him. Fred F. Hammond, a nephew, left for Willowemoc immediately after the news of his uncle's death.
