

SCOUT CAMP WAUWEPEX OPEN FOR SEASON JULY 11

Camp Wauwepex, the seven weeks' camp conducted by the Nassau County Council, Boy Scouts of America, which is located on Deer Pond, Wading River, Long Island, will open on July 11 and continue until August 29. Application for enrollment may be made at any time to County Headquarters, Andrew's Building, Mineola, L. I. Seventy-five more boys are now registered than at this time a year ago.

The camp site is a six-hundred-acre tract of woodland surrounding Deer Pond, Wading River, about one and one-half miles from the railroad station. The use of the property has been donated by Wm. K. Vanderbilt and Harry Payne Whitney. Deer Pond is a beautiful lake of fresh water, surrounded by deep woods, which make it an ideal loca-

tion for a Scout Camp. Salt water bathing is also available, and the Council has the exclusive use of this property.

The camp is equipped with a large wooden mess hall, general headquarters building, a museum, three large navy rafts, boats and canoes. The boys live in regular army squad tents with wooden platforms and sleep on the regular army cots. Through the generosity of Albert Z. Gray and W. R. Grace of Westbury, an addition will be built to the mess hall, to take care of the larger attendance.

A Woodcraft Division under the instruction of John B. Cuno, of the Forest Service, Washington, D. C., will be included this season. John V. Watkins, of Pittsburgh University and Carnegie Museum, will have charge of the camp museum.

Beloved of all the "old timers" Charles Jones, the cook, known affectionately as "Grisly," will turn flapjacks for the fifth year. Other members of the supervisory personnel are Dr. Wm. Borman of the staff of Montefiore Hospital, Manhattan, and F. Howard Covey, camp director, as-

sisted by I. F. Southworth, who was at one time a Rocky Mountain ranger. Swimming instruction will be given by Ray L. Novarine, assisted by expert life guards who are always on duty.

Boro Man Near Drowning Saved by Unknown Man

A man who withheld his name yesterday rescued Harry Solomon, 25, 52 Cook street, who had jumped in the East River.

The rescuer, removing his coat and shoes, dived into the river, and held Solomon above the surface until dock hands threw him a rope.
