No School, Public Assembly in Polio Drive

-Continued from Page 3 physicians, can leave the body open for a polio attack.

Called by Dr. Robert Di Pasca, deputy health commissioner for Babylon Town, the meeting was sanctioned by Dr. Rafle, who explained last night that the large number of polio cases in Babylon necessitated the action.

According to Rafle, the action prevents any school in the district from having football practice until the ban is lifted. Unless the polio rate declines, the inter scholastic football schedule starting Oct. 1 may be upset, school officials admitted.

Rafle said that in no other area in Suffolk were bans on athletics and strenuous exercise being considered.

Two Deaths.

Of the two deaths reported

yesterday, one occurred outside the county, but the disease was apparently contracted within the Suffolk boundaries in both cases.

Richard Tilly, a 13-year-old Nassau Boy Scout, died Saturday in St. Charles Hospital for Crippled Children. The youngster, a resident of Valley Stream, was one of the three Nassau boys stricken at Nassau County Council Boy Scout Camp Wauwepex. The other two boys are reportedly recovering.

Dr. Rafle today is checking on the death of Hutchinson K Fairman, 37-year-old advertising agency vice president who succumbed Wednesday in Neurological Institute, Manhattan.

Hutchinson, who spent Summers in Quogue with his wife and two children on Ocean Ave., was vice president of Hewitt, Ogilvy, Benson and Mather Inc. in Manhattan. His Winter home was at 261 East 81st St. in Manhattan.

A third death is also being investigated by the health department and may boost the Suffolk total to 10 deaths. On Monday, Henry Lewis O'Brien, 19, a Westhampton Beach Summer resident, died of polio in New York Hospital. A Cornell Umiversity student, he was stricken two weeks ago in Westhampton Beach.

Five new cases were recorded in Riverhead yesterday, bringing the total to 21 for the eweek, 97 for the month and 130 for the year. The newest cases include two from Babylon, and one each from Wading River, Brentwood and Quogue.

The deaths toll includes three each in Babylon and Quogue, and one each in Hampton Bays and Blue Point, Dr. Rafle said.
