Scout Who Flunked His Test Still Missing

Garden City—Boy Scout William Lipsey Jr. was still missing this morning, more than 60 hours after he disappeared from Camp Wauwepex in Wading River. His parents, who are maintaining a sleepless vigil in their home at 8 Westbury Road, were near collapse today.

The 14-year-old scout dropped from sight after learning that he failed to win a First Class badge. He had been at the camp a month and "loved it," according to his mother, but the boy couldn't face his parents when he found out he was not to be included in the Court of Honor rites.

That was on Saturday. Bill had supper with his friends at the camp at 6 PM, but was missing when his parents arrived at Wauwepex to witness the honor citation ceremonies. Since then police have issued a 13-state alarm, covering New England and south to Delaware and Virginia. He is believed to have hitchhiked away from the camp.

Bill was a sensitive boy who tried hard to make the First Class grade. He practiced compass direction-finding, learned to cook and

was adept at Morse code. Sixty-two Scout leaders at Wauwepex searched through Saturday night for Bill. On Sunday 250 fellow Scouts combed the 600-acre camp. Later, State police, with bloodhounds, followed his trail to Manorville Road, which connects Jericho Turnpike and Route 25A. Police do not know in what direction the boy may have hitchhiked.

The missing boy's father described Bill as 5 feet 5 inches, about 110 pounds, with brown hair and eyes. He was in the second year at Garden City High School. The police alarm stated that Bill was wearing either his Boy Scout uniform or blue dungarees and sneakers. The father said the boy had nothing else with him, neither money nor belongings.

Weather Fells Two Lindenhurst Women
