

## 2 Bakeries Get Threats; Peace Talk Set

The strike of AFL bakery truck drivers entered its eighth day today with a "peace" parley set for 5 PM. Nassau police however, are keeping an eye on two local bakeries which reported threats of violence made by anonymous persons.

Yesterday the Nassau Boy Scout camp at Wading River reported it was unable to get bread ordered from a Riverhead baker "because of some union interference."

Deputy Chief Inspector Andrew Kirk said he had received calls from two Nassau bakeries which said they had been told to stop delivering bread "or else." He said the two establishments were being watched by police.

At Camp Wauwepex, Ray Brown, director, said he had arranged with a Riverhead baker to bake 100 loaves of bread for the camp's 550 hungry Scouts. But, Brown said, when he called for the bread, a man who identified himself as a union agent, said he could not take the bread because he was not a "regular customer."

Brown explained that the bread was not for sale but for the Scouts, but the union agent didn't budge an inch.

"We've been baking our own bread and biscuits since last Tuesday, but it's put a strain on our cooks," Brown explained.

Meanwhile, midst new violence in New York City, Mayor Impellitteri met with federal mediators in an attempt to lay the groundwork for a strike settlement.

And the nearly forgotten art of home bread baking was coming back in vogue as housewives got out rolling pins, baking powder and flour to bake their own bread (see centerfold).

The Manhattan peace parley

broke up at midnight last night with both sides agreeing to study a proposal set forth by the Mayor's Citizens Committee on the strike. Union, management and city officials were to meet again at 5 PM.

The committee recommended the 5-day week for the teamsters, the major issue involved in the strike. The proposed contract would be effective for two years, retroactive to last May 1. There is a wage reopening clause set up for May, 1952, contingent upon 10-day written notice.

The union was to put the proposal before its membership today. The Bakers' Association also will decide on the plan today. If accepted by both sides, bread deliveries will resume Thursday.
