

NASSAU SCOUT CAMP VOTED O. K. BY BOYS SEASON NEARS END

Wireless, Swimming and Nature Museum Are Features of the Camp Program.

Saturday, August 6th, begins the fourth week of Camp Wauwepex, the summer camp of the Nassau County Council, Boy Scouts of America, located at Millers Place, L. I. All of the Scouts who have attended the camp are enthusiastic and satisfied with the conditions, and also vote the commissary the best ever. The camp is in charge of Frank C. Bond, assisted by Adolph Richter, who is in charge of swimming and athletics, and Walter O'Mally, who has charge of the general supervision of Scout instruction.

The camp is divided into two divisions, each division being in charge of a division leader. Mortimer D. Jones or Hempstead is in charge of Division 1 and Kenneth E. Place of Floral Park is in charge of Division 2. There is a great deal of rivalry between the two divisions to obtain the Honor Flag, which is awarded each day to the division having the best and cleanest camp site.

A complete wireless outfit has been installed by "Sparks" Goldsmith of Floral Park Troop 4. By means of this outfit the camp is run on standard time from Arlington, and receives all of the Associated Press News at 10 o'clock every night. In addition to this the boys are entertained several nights a week by phonographic and musical concerts sent out by a station in Massachusetts.

The Museum Tent is fast being filled up by material brought in by the boys. It has been learned that the camp site was at one time a large Indian encampment and the boys are on the lookout all of the time for arrowheads and other Indian implements of which quite a number have already been turned in. It has been reported that a number of Indian graves are in the vicinity but up to the present time none have been located.

As is usual in all Scout camps, swimming is one of the greatest attractions. Swimming call is sounded twice daily—at 12:15 and at 4:15. Mr. Richter has divided the camp into three classes. First class for non-swimmers, second class for those who can swim under fifty yards, third class for those who can swim over 50 yards. Up to the present time all non-swimmers who have been in camp have been taught to swim. Special instruction is given in life-saving, artificial respiration and boat handling. Mr. Richter is a member of the Red Cross Life Saving Crew and Mr. O'Mally, who assists him, is a member of the New York Volunteer Life Saving Corps.

For the past three weeks the camp has been full to capacity and indications are that the remaining three weeks will also be filled.
