

## Nassau Scouts Prepare Camp

### New 'H' Type Dock Will Aid Swimming—Cabins Built for Winter Test

Wading River, May 12—Camp Wauwepex, official camp of the Nassau County Boy Scout Council, is being prepared for the Summer season here. Scout officials announced today, reporting several new additions to the camp upon which construction is being pushed.

By the time camp is ready for the season's opening, it is expected work will be completed upon a new "H" type dock for water front activities. The "H" dock, Scout officials said, is considered a highly efficient form of construction for camp docks.

In the shoreward inclosure of the "H" will be two separate divisions for bathing. In the shallow area of the two the "sinkees," Scouts who have not learned to swim, will be taken care of and taught the rudiments of swimming.

In the slightly deeper half of the two parts will be the area for "beginners," Scouts who can swim but not well enough to qualify for deep-water swimming. The open end of the "H" will be reserved for the Scouts who have qualified as swimmers and are permitted to swim in water over their heads.

#### Winter Cabins Built

Other construction which the Scout officials reported includes the manufacture of two large cabins especially designed for Winter camping quarters, each large enough for eight boys and their leader. Planned as an experiment, the cabins will be followed by more of the same construction if they are satisfactory.
