SYNOPSIS

Don Alejandro and Don Nacho Torres, by arrangement with the governor, have surrendered themselves to the Capitan on his accusation of their treason, and Judge Vasca is expected from the capital to conduct the trial next morning. Diego, visiting his father and his friend, finds them in splendid spirits, for they know the Judge to be honest, and therefore Monasterio will be finally discredited, and the days of injustice over.

Monasterio, in his office, fears exactly the same thing. He schemes with his crooked licenciado to find a means to prevent Judge Vasca from appearing in court. If the Judge can be delayed, Pina will be appointed to conduct the trial. And he can quickly and summarily order the hidalges to be put to death.

Therefore Monasterio sends Sergeant Garcia and a few of his men to an inn where Judge Vasca is to stop, with orders to delay him at all costs.

When the sergeant kearns that the Judge is a great lover of food am wine, he conceives a splendid plan. He has a great banquet made ready, with pretty maids to serve it. Judge Vasca responds happily to these amenities.
